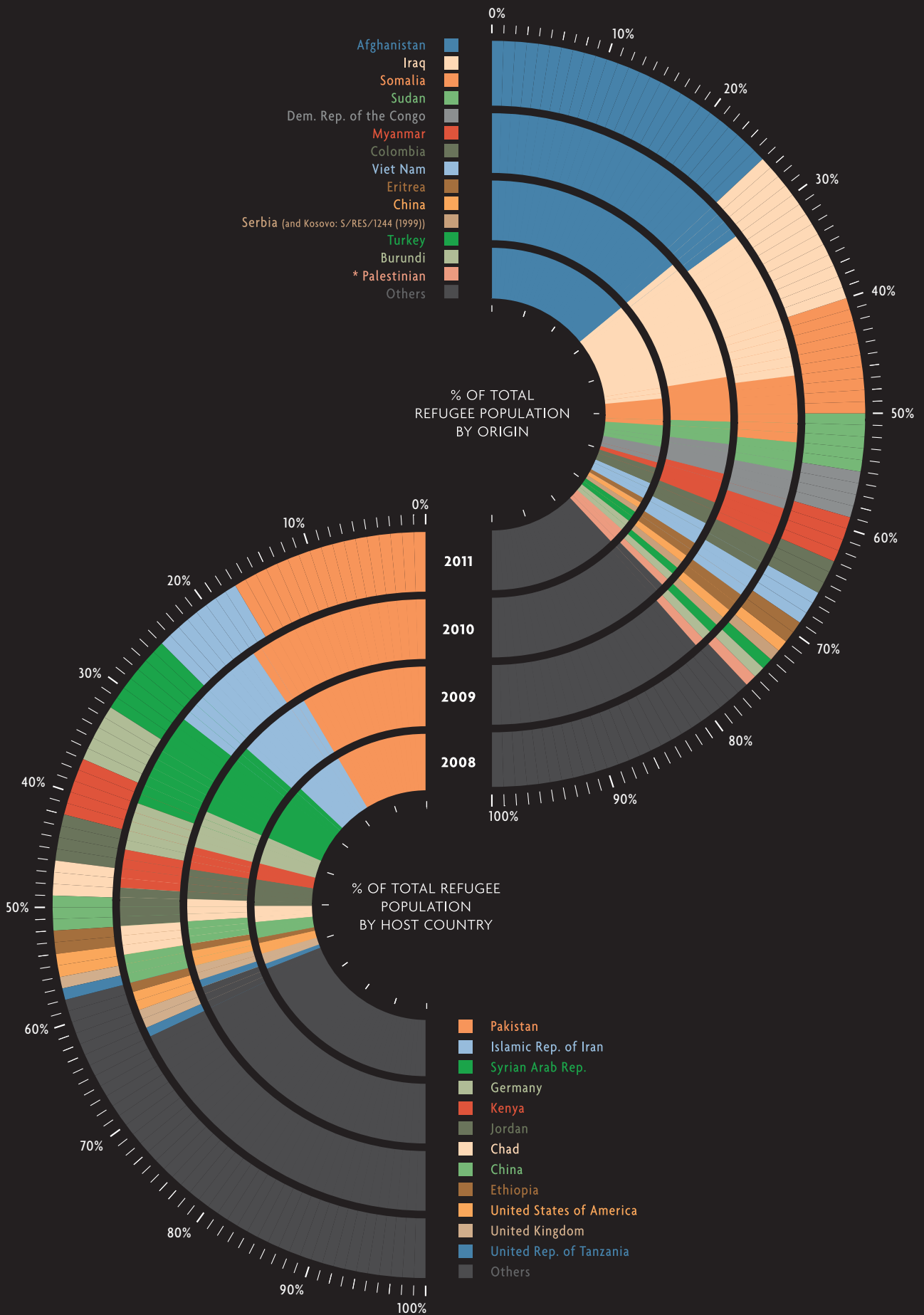


TOP POPULATIONS BY ORIGIN HOST COUNTRIES

MAIN FINDINGS

This section provides an overview of the major statistical developments in 2011 and a summary of key observations. More detailed information is provided in Chapters I to VI.

TOTAL POPULATION OF CONCERN

The 2011 Statistical Yearbook identifies seven population categories:

1. refugees;
2. asylum-seekers;
3. internally displaced persons (IDPs) protected/assisted by UNHCR;
4. stateless persons;
5. returned refugees;
6. returned IDPs;
7. others of concern.

These categories are collectively referred to as “total population of concern” or “persons of concern”.¹

35.4 MILLION

By the end of 2011, the total population of concern to UNHCR was estimated at **35.4 million people**.

REFUGEES

10.4 MILLION

The number of refugees at end 2011 was **10.4 million**, including 604,000 people considered by UNHCR to be in a refugee-like situation. 2011 was a year marked by major refugee crises. Conflicts in Côte d'Ivoire, Libya, Somalia and Sudan forced more than 800,000 refugees to flee to neighbouring countries. This was the **highest number in over a decade**.

By end of 2011, developing countries hosted **8.4 million refugees**, or 80 per cent of the global refugee population with the 48 Least Developed Countries³ providing asylum to 2.3 million refugees, or 22 per cent.

Asia hosted about half of the global refugee population (49%), followed by Africa (28%), Europe (15%), North America (4%), Latin America and the Caribbean (4%), and Oceania (0.3%).⁴

By end 2011, according to UNHCR's global estimates, there were close to **2.7 million Afghan refugees**, 26 per cent of the world's refugee population under UNHCR's responsibility. Iraq was the second largest country of origin of refugees (1.4 million)⁵, followed by Somalia (1.1 million), Sudan (500,000)⁶, the Democratic Republic of the Congo (491,500), and Myanmar (414,600).

Pakistan, with 1.7 million refugees, was the country **hosting the highest number of refugees** at the end of 2011. Other major asylum countries included the **Islamic Republic of Iran** (887,000), the Syrian Arab Republic (755,400; Government estimate), Germany (571,700), and Kenya (566,500).

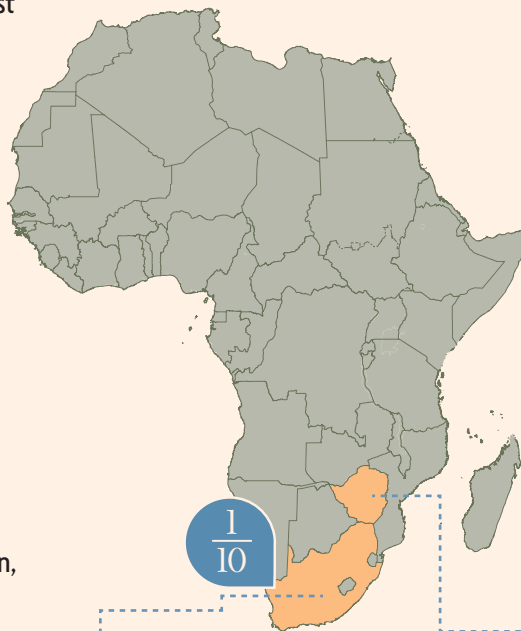
During 2011, **876,100 individual applications** for asylum or refugee status were submitted to governments and UNHCR offices in **171 countries or territories**. This was a 3 per cent increase compared to 2010 (850,300 claims) and in line with increases observed elsewhere.⁷ An estimated 738,200 of these were initial applications submitted at first instance procedures while 137,900 claims were submitted on appeal, including to courts.⁸

UNHCR offices registered **11 per cent** of applications registered globally, or 98,800 individual applications.

216,500

Approximately 216,500 asylum-seekers were either **recognized as refugees** (172,500) or granted a complementary form of protection (44,000) during 2011. This number includes an estimated 21,100 individuals who received **initial negative decisions** on their asylum claim but were later granted asylum at the appeal or review stage.

Refugee status based on the 1951 Convention was granted in **30 per cent of decisions**

in 2011. With the addition of complementary forms of protection, 38 per cent of all substantive asylum decisions taken in 2011 were **positive**. These rates are virtually identical to those of 2010.

South Africa remained a significant country for asylum-seekers with close to 107,000 new asylum claims registered in 2011, 10 per cent of all new individual applications globally. The United States of America received the second largest number of asylum applications in 2011, an estimated 76,000, followed by France (52,100), Germany (45,700), Italy (34,100), Sweden (29,600), and Belgium (26,000).

Zimbabwe was the country of origin for the greatest number of asylum-seekers in 2011, with 52,500 new applications submitted by Zimbabwean nationals during the year.

By the end of the year, some 895,000 individuals were reported to be **awaiting a decision** on their asylum claims.

In 2011, the type of location was reported for only 13 million persons of concern, mainly in **non-industrialized countries**.⁹ The data revealed that IDPs, returned IDPs and returned refugees predominately resided in rural areas while refugees and asylum-seekers were more often living in **urban areas**.

For the **10.4 million refugees**, the type of accommodation was known for 7.7 million (74%). Half of this number was living in individual or private accommodation. One third of refugees were reported as living in camps or in camp like settlements.

The largest refugee camp in the world in 2011 was the **Hagadera camp in Dadaab, Kenya**, with 137,500 inhabitants at year end. This camp, along with the Dagahaley and Ifo camps, are part of the Dadaab complex with a total population of more than 453,000 refugees by the end of 2011.

The available data revealed that, on average, **49 per cent** of persons of concern were female: 48 per cent of refugees, 50 per cent of returned refugees, and 51 per cent of IDPs and stateless persons.¹⁰

Of the 35.4 million people of concern to UNHCR in 2011, data on sex and age are available respectively for **24.4 million people (69%)**, and for **15.8 million (45%)**.

Pakistan had the largest number of refugees in relation to its economic capacity, hosting **605 refugees** per 1 USD Gross Domestic Product (GDP) (PPP)¹¹ per capita.

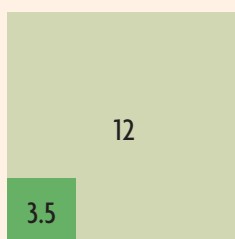
Data on age showed that on average **children under the age of 18** represented 47 per cent of the overall population of concern, with 13 per cent **under the age of five**. Close to half (48%) of the population were between the ages of 18 and 59 years, and 5 per cent were 60 years or older.

Among refugees and people in refugee-like situations, children constituted **46 per cent** of the population. In contrast, 52 per cent of those returning refugees in 2011 were under 18 years.

The Democratic Republic of the Congo was the country with the second largest number of refugees per 1 USD GDP (PPP) per capita (399 refugees), followed by Kenya (321 refugees), and Liberia (290 refugees). The largest **refugee-hosting developed country** was Germany in 26th place, with 15 refugees per 1 USD GDP (PPP) per capita.

STATELESS PERSONS



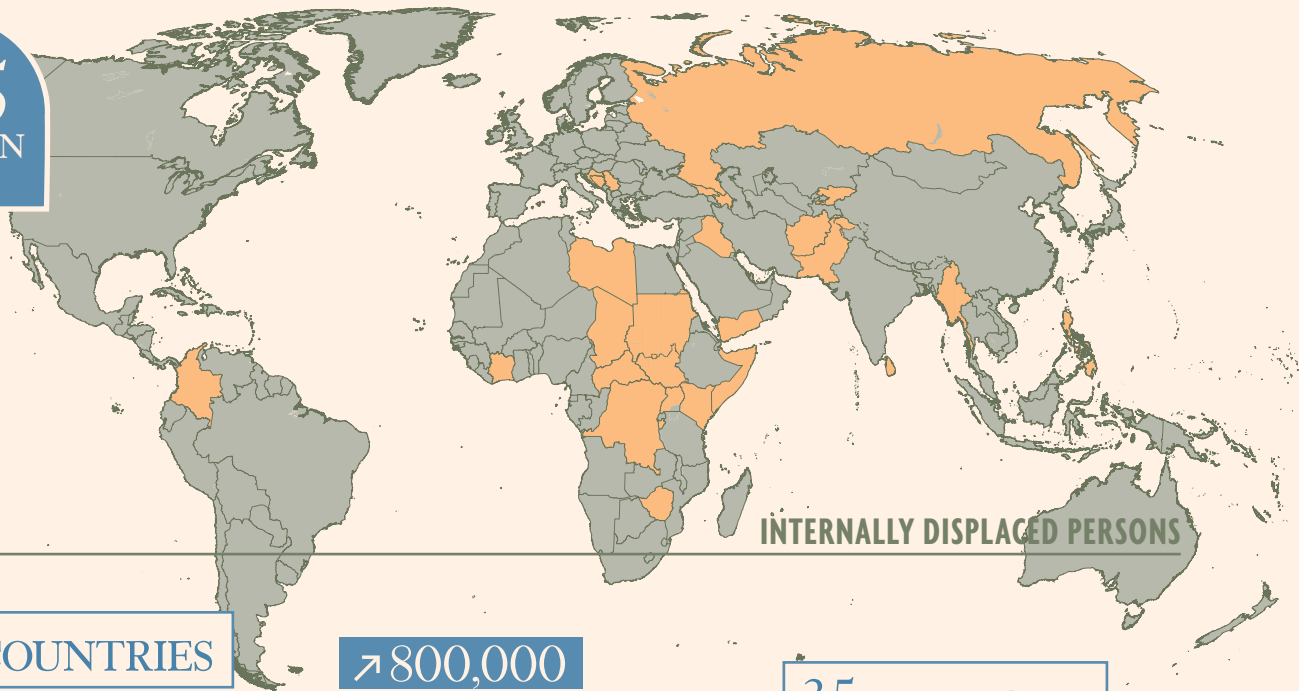
At end 2011, UNHCR identified some 3.5 million stateless persons in **64 countries**. The actual number of stateless persons worldwide was **estimated at up to 12 million**.

UNHCR's statistics included IDP populations in **26 countries**. In 2011, its offices reported some **2.9 million people** who were newly displaced in 2011, while over 3.2 million IDPs, mostly in the Democratic Republic of Congo and Côte d'Ivoire, returned to their homes during the year.

The number of internally displaced persons benefiting from UNHCR's protection and assistance activities was almost 15.5 million by end of 2011. This was the **second highest figure on record**, nearly 800,000 more than the figure at end of 2010 (14.7 million) and more than double that of 2005 (6.6 million).¹²

3.5 MILLION

Globally, an estimated **3.5 million people** were newly displaced within the borders of their countries, one-fifth more than in 2010.¹³

DURABLE SOLUTIONS

Some 532,000 refugees **repatriated voluntarily** during 2011. Although more than double the figure for 2010 (197,600), this was still one of lowest annual figures for repatriation since 2001. The main countries of return included Libya (149,000), Côte d'Ivoire (135,200), Afghanistan (71,100), Iraq (67,100), Sudan (50,100), and the Democratic Republic of the Congo (21,100).

The **main beneficiaries of UNHCR-assisted resettlement** were refugees from Bhutan (18,100), Myanmar (17,900), Iraq (8,900), and Somalia (4,800).

Over the course of 2011, UNHCR submitted some **92,000 individual cases** for resettlement consideration. Ten per cent of these submissions were for women and girls at risk, the highest percentage in over six years. In 2011, almost 62,000 refugees departed for resettlement countries with UNHCR's assistance, the largest numbers from Nepal (18,100), Thailand (9,600), Malaysia (8,400), the Syrian Arab Republic (4,700), and Turkey (4,400).

According to figures provided by governments, **22 industrialized countries** admitted 79,800 resettled refugees during 2011, nearly 20,000 less than in 2010 (98,800) and a reduction of 20 per cent. The countries receiving the largest numbers of resettled refugees were the United States of America (51,500),¹⁴ Canada (12,900), Australia (9,200), Sweden (1,900), and Norway (1,300).

Introduction

THE 2011 STATISTICAL YEARBOOK assesses recent levels and trends in populations of concern to the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), reports on progress towards durable solutions and provides demographic data on

beneficiaries of UNHCR's protection and assistance programmes. As such, it serves as an empirical resource to be used in planning, monitoring and evaluating of UNHCR activities.

The basis for UNHCR statistical activities is derived from the 1951 Convention relating to the Status of Refugees¹⁵ as well as the Statute of the Office of the United Nations High Com-

missioner for Refugees.¹⁶ For more than sixty years, countries have been providing information to UNHCR concerning the number and conditions of refugees in their territories. Statistical data help enable the international community to assess global forced displacement. The commemorations of the 60th anniversary of the 1951 Refugee Convention and the 50th anniversary

of the 1961 Convention on the Reduction of Statelessness in December 2011 confirmed this when a majority of the 155 States in attendance announced concrete steps to improve the protection of refugees and stateless persons.¹⁷

By the end of 2011, some 42.5 million people worldwide were considered as forcibly displaced due to conflict and persecution. They included 15.2 million refugees,¹⁸ 26.4 million internally displaced persons (IDPs)¹⁹ and 895,000 individuals whose asylum applications had not yet been adjudicated by the end of the year.

The number of refugees and IDPs under UNHCR's care increased by 700,000 people from 2010 to 25.9 million by year-end. The number of refugees decreased slightly to 10.4 million from 10.55 in 2010, while the number of IDPs protected or assisted by UNHCR in 2011 increased to 15.5 million from 14.7 the previous year. In addition, UNHCR estimated that up to 12 million people were stateless, although official statistics covered only some 3.5 million of them.

An estimated 3.2 million IDPs were able to return home in 2011, the highest number in many years.

Statistics reflected in this Yearbook are, for the most part, those reported by UNHCR country offices drawn either from their own data or those of the government. The use of estimates is clearly indicated.

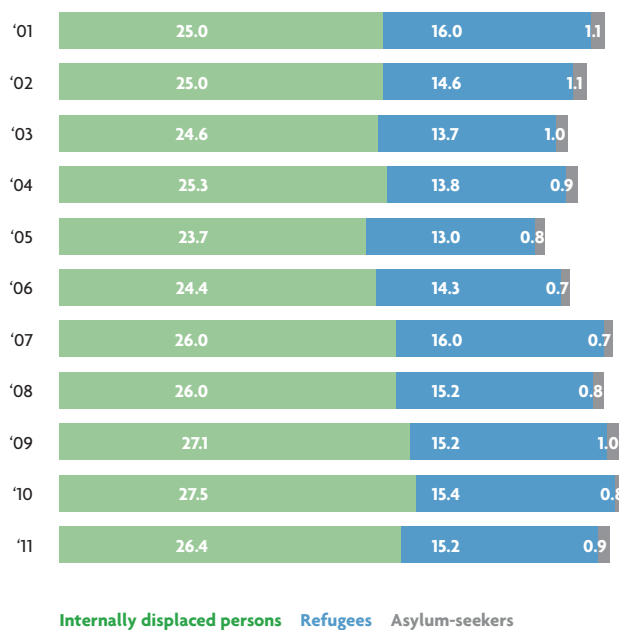

THE 2011 STATISTICAL YEARBOOK comprises a **Global Analysis** and a series of tables in the Annex. The Global Analysis includes six chapters providing a detailed insight into global trends, levels and patterns in populations under UNHCR's mandate. **Chapter I** describes data sources and methodology. Its purpose is to present the meta-data needed to understand and interpret UNHCR's published figures, focusing on basic concepts and

definitions, data collection and estimation methods, and issues of data quality.

Chapter II presents a global overview of the size, main origins and destinations of the populations of concern to UNHCR in 2011. **Chapter III** focuses on the main population movements during 2011, with particular emphasis on durable solutions and new refugee outflows. **Chapter IV** provides an overview of asylum applications and components of the refugee status determination process. Demographic characteristics, such as sex and age, are discussed in **Chapter V**, which also provides information on the types of locations of populations. **Chapter VI** introduces the concept of Information Management in UNHCR, a prerequisite for improved reporting in the humanitarian context. The concept is illustrated by presenting the organization's information management activities in Ethiopia and Côte d'Ivoire during 2011.

The tables appearing in the Annex provide additional detailed data for 2011. Statistical data on historical trends that allow an easy global comparison by region and by country for all major themes can be found on UNHCR's statistical website (www.unhcr.org/statistics) and downloaded from UNHCR's Statistical Online Population Database at www.unhcr.org/statistics/populationdatabase.

Some data contained in this publication may differ from those published earlier due to retroactive adjustments or the inclusion of previously unavailable data. It is expected that the data contained in the 2011 Yearbook will likewise be subject to minor future adjustments. ■

Sources, Methods and Data Quality Issues

POLICY DECISIONS WITH respect to UNHCR operations around the world, as well as budget considerations, depend on accurate data. Inaccurate data can potentially mislead policy decision-makers which could consequently affect programmes and activities in the organization. Essentially, accurate data on persons of concern can be considered as the ‘bedrock’ of most key policy decisions affecting UNHCR’s operations. Therefore, the

sources and methods used to collect this vital information need to be clearly outlined and understood in order to ensure the credibility and reliability of the data. Similarly, careful and precise analysis of collected data is crucial to ensure easy understanding for all users.

UNHCR disseminates statistics on refugees and other persons of concern to the general public. The Office strives to ensure that data on populations of concern are provided in a timely and accurate manner. The

main purpose of this chapter is to introduce the basic concepts underlying the data presented in this Yearbook. These include definitions, sources, methods, estimation methods and other aspects of data quality. Most of the statistics have been collected through UNHCR’s Annual Statistical Reports¹⁹, and generally reflect the definition and data collection methods of governments, except in countries where only UNHCR registration systems are used.

DEFINITIONS AND SCOPE

UNHCR identifies seven population categories, collectively referred to as “persons of concern”: (1) refugees; (2) asylum-seekers; (3) internally displaced persons (IDPs); (4) refugees who have returned home (returnees); (5) IDPs who have returned home; (6) stateless persons; and (7) other people who do not fall under any of the above categories but to whom the Office extends protection. In 2007, two sub-categories were introduced: (a) peo-

ple in refugee-like situations (included under refugees); and (b) people in IDP-like situations (included under IDPs).

Refugees include individuals recognized under the 1951 Convention relating to the Status of Refugees and its 1967 Protocol; individuals recognized under the 1969 OAU Convention Governing the Specific Aspects of Refugee Problems in Africa; those recognized in accordance with the UNHCR Statute; in-

dividuals granted complementary forms of protection²⁰; and those enjoying “temporary protection”²¹. The refugee category also includes people in a refugee-like situation.²²

Asylum-seekers (with “pending cases”) are individuals who have sought international protection and whose claims for refugee status have not yet been determined. Those covered in this report refer to claimants whose individual applications were pending at the end of 2011, irrespective of when they may have been lodged.

Internally displaced persons (IDPs) are people or groups of individuals who have been forced to leave their homes or places of habitual residence, in particular as a result of, or in order to avoid the effects of, armed conflict,

situations of generalized violence, violations of human rights, or natural/man-made disasters, and who have not crossed an international border.²³

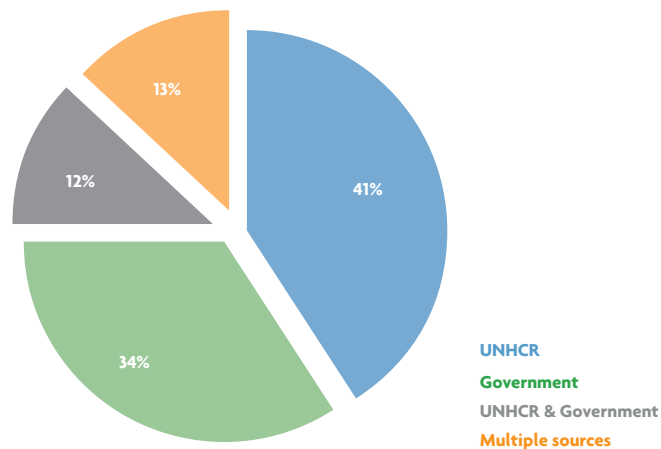
UNHCR is involved in seeking to address situations of internal displacement in a number of countries. The populations reported in its statistics are limited to people displaced by conflict, or persons in an IDP-like situation²⁴, to whom the Office extends protection or assistance. UNHCR's IDP statistics do not therefore necessarily reflect the entire IDP population in a given country, but only those who are protected and/or assisted by the Office. Moreover, under the cluster approach²⁵ UNHCR provides support to both IDPs and other affected persons, whereas the latter are not included in the statistics. Hence, UNHCR's statistics do not provide a comprehensive picture of global internal displacement, nor of total numbers assisted by the Office in such situations.²⁶

Returned refugees (returnees) are former refugees who have returned to their country of origin spontaneously or in an organized fashion but are yet to be fully integrated. Such return would normally only take place in conditions of safety and dignity. For the purposes of this report, only refugees who returned between January and December 2011 are included. However, in practice, operations may assist returnees for longer periods.

Returned IDPs refer to those IDPs who were beneficiaries of UNHCR's protection and assistance activities and who returned to their areas of origin or habitual residence between January and December 2011. However, in practice, operations may assist IDP returnees for longer periods.

Stateless persons are defined under international law as persons who

are not considered as nationals by any State under the operation of its law. In other words, they do not possess the nationality of any State. UNHCR statistics mainly refer to persons who fall under this definition. UNHCR has been given a global mandate by the United Nations General Assembly to contribute to the prevention and reduction of statelessness and the protection of stateless persons. The Office also has specific functions under Article II of the 1961 Convention on the Reduction of Statelessness to receive claims from persons who may benefit from the safeguards contained in that Convention and to assist them and the States concerned to resolve those claims. UNHCR's Executive Committee has requested the Office to report regularly on the magnitude of the phenomenon.

Other groups or people of concern refer to individuals who do not necessarily fall directly into any of the groups above, but to whom UNHCR extends its protection and/or assis-

tance services, based on humanitarian or other special grounds.

SOURCES OF REFUGEE DATA

Governments, UNHCR and Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs) are the principal actors in refugee data collection. It is important to note that States have the primary responsibility to register and care for refugees. As not all States have the resources and capacity to collect refugee data, UNHCR often provides the requisite technical assistance and resources for data collection. The collection of data is either conducted by governments on their own, by UNHCR alone, or jointly. These two sources accounted for 87 per cent of UNHCR's refugee statistics in 2011. In many industrialized countries, refugee data collection is often done by governments alone with virtually no, or minimal input, from UNHCR.

The trend of combined data collection between governments and UNHCR has remained virtually unchanged for the past three years despite numerous efforts to transfer data collection responsibility to states providing asylum. In 2011, UNHCR alone accounted for 41 per cent of global refugee data, government accounted for 34 per cent, joint collection between UNHCR and governments accounted for 12 per cent while NGOs and others

accounted for the remaining percentage. Refugee statistics in some countries are from multiple sources. In 2011, 23 countries collected data from multiple sources.

DATA COLLECTION METHODS

The methods of refugee data collection include census, registration and surveys or estimation. In some operations, a combination of methods is used to provide refugee data while other operations may rely on only one method. Registration accounts for a greater proportion of the methods used for collection of refugee data by UNHCR.

UNHCR attaches great importance to refugee registration. As a result, the Office has rolled-out its own registration database, *proGres*,²⁷ in many of its operations around the world in order to ensure effective registration and accurate recording of refugee data. The *proGres* database has become a vital resource tool for providing refugee statistics. Accurate registration provides a firm foundation for the delivery of protection, assistance and monitoring and enhances the activities of the Office. UNHCR's refugee statistics rely heavily on registration data extracted from the *proGres* database. This da-

tabase has both legal and administrative status for providing entitlements to beneficiaries. By the end of 2011, this software was used in more than 80 countries, including its application by governments in six countries.

Biometric registration is being used for refugee data collection in a number of operations [see page 19]. This electronic system of refugee data collection provides credibility and reliability to refugee statistics. Biometric registration is able to detect double or multiple registrations and invariably improves data collection.

nationals of the country. The biometric device cannot prevent or detect non-refugees from registering as refugees. To be fully effective, it should not be used as a stand-alone method. Ideally there should be an existing national finger-print database to ensure cross-matching. Moreover, the biometric device itself is relatively expensive. At the end of 2011, 15 countries had rolled-out biometric registration in their various operations.

In 2011, more than 180 countries and territories provided refugee data. While some countries used a single

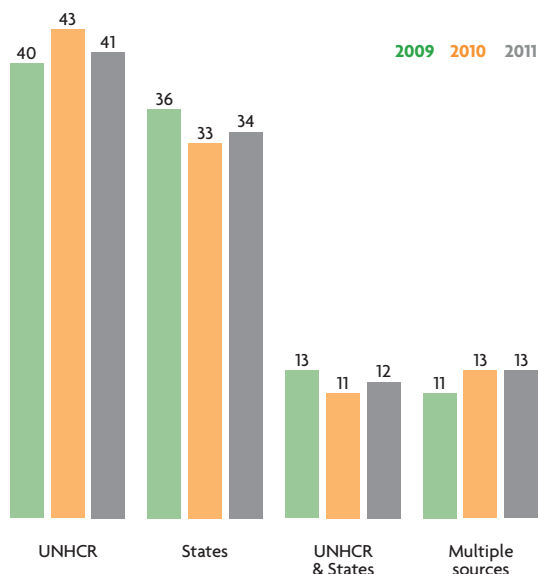
The use of biometric registration can significantly deter fraudulent registration. However, it is important to note that biometric registration is not a panacea for both registration and identity fraud. It is especially not effective in an operation where there is no existing finger-print database of

method for refugee data collection others tended to use multiple data collection methods. Clearly, each method of data collection has its strengths and weaknesses. For instance, aside from being expensive and time consuming, registration is a very comprehensive method of data collection. It provides detailed information on registered individuals and is therefore highly accurate. Estimation provides information quickly and is a method that can be used regardless of the security situation. It lacks, however, the accuracy of registration. In principle, estimation can have a large margin of error, rendering the data less reliable.

In the majority of countries – some 65 per cent – registration was used as the main method of data collection. Estimation accounted for 15 per cent, while registration and estimation combined accounted for 6 per cent. Some 26 countries (14%) obtained refugee figures through surveys, censuses and/or combined methods (see Figure I3).

In most industrialized countries, which do not provide statistical information on the number of refugees,

UNHCR uses estimation based on official data on the number of asylum-seekers recognized over a 10-year period. In 2011, estimation as the sole basis for refugee data was used in 28 countries (15%), most of them industrialized.²⁸

The example of Sweden illustrates the estimation process in industrialized countries. Ten years is assumed to be the average time required for a refugee to acquire the nationality of his/her host country.

In some countries, more than two methods are used, making data comparability difficult. UNHCR ensures that statistics from all sources are triangulated to increase the reliability and quality of the data. This requires regular interaction with the stakeholders involved in collecting and compiling statistics.

SOURCES OF IDP DATA

Data on IDPs are collected by states, UN agencies, including UNHCR, inter-agency organizations and NGOs. The overwhelming majority of the data is from inter-agency organizations through the cluster approach. Unlike refugee statistics, IDP statistics in the Yearbook do not include all IDPs around the world. The IDP statistics only account for IDPs who were beneficiaries of UNHCR's protection and assistance activities during the reporting period. UNHCR is directly or in-

directly involved in the source of IDP data for this report.

The main methods for collecting IDP data include estimation, profiling and surveys. Profiling is a frequently used approach in many IDP situations to the extent that the term profiling has virtually become synonymous with IDP data collection. Profiling provides an assessment of the needs and characteristics of a cross-section of IDPs that is eventually used to estimate or extrapolate the general information and data on IDPs.²⁹ In the context of IDP statistics, the major source is the joint parties of the IDP clusters.

OTHER DATA QUALITY ISSUES

Taking into account the limitations of some methodologies in data collection as well as the capacity constraints of certain countries, data obtained from each country are carefully evaluated and reviewed. Due to the importance of statistics, any data received are processed and analyzed to ensure validity of the data collection method. UNHCR has put in place a rigorous mechanism of data quality control. The system of quality control ensures data consistency across all countries for effective and meaningful data analysis and dissemination. All data for this report have undergone thorough standard data cleaning techniques to ensure completeness, consistency and reliability.

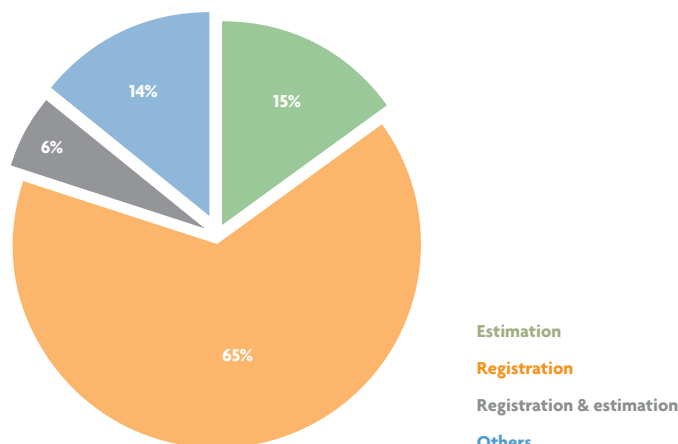
In compiling refugee statistics, the Office ensures that data from different sources and with different methods are triangulated for the purpose of data comparability, reliability and credibility. The triangulation of data also provides robust statistics for meaningful analysis. It is important to note that data confidentiality of persons of concern is respected and taken into account for statistical reporting.

Special attention should be paid when analysing data referring to a country which has dissolved. In the Statistical Yearbook, historical data pertaining to the former USSR are reported under the Russian Federation, while those for the former Czechoslovakia are reported under the Czech Republic. Data for the former Yugoslavia as well as Serbia and Montenegro have been reported under Serbia (and Kosovo: S/RES/1244 (1999)). Data pertaining to Sudan before the declaration of independence of South Sudan includes the latter. Since independence, data for South Sudan has been reported separately. In most tables in the Annex, the word "Democratic" has been abbreviated to "Dem.", whereas the word "Republic" is often reflected as "Rep."

Figures below 1,000 are generally rounded to the nearest 10; figures between 1,000 and 10,000 are rounded to the nearest 100; figures between 10,000 and 100,000 are rounded to the nearest 1,000; figures between 100,000 and 1 million are rounded to the nearest 10,000; and figures above 1 million are rounded to the nearest 100,000.

Unless specified, the 2011 Statistical Yearbook does not refer to events occurring after 31 December 2011.

In focus: Biometric registration in Liberia

The post-election crisis in Côte d'Ivoire in late November 2010 forced about 200,000 Ivoirians to seek refuge in Liberia. The refugees resided in camps, relocation areas and host communities across Liberia in four different counties (Nimba, Grand Gedeh, Maryland, and River Gee). The dispersed nature of the population movements to various regions in Liberia posed many challenges to their proper

registration and the subsequent provision of protection, assistance and monitoring interventions by UNHCR and its partners. To address registration and identity management difficulties, efforts were made to undertake comprehensive biometrics finger-printing of persons of concern in Liberia.

UNHCR Liberia implemented biometric registration of its refugee population in early 2012. The exer-

cise commenced in Bahn Camp in the town of Saclepea in Nimba county with the participation of about 160 UNHCR, UN and partner staff including the Liberia Refugee Repatriation and Resettlement Commission. Liberia was the first country in the history of UNHCR operations in the West African sub-region to include biometrics enrolment as part of its individual registration activities.

BIOMETRICS – A TOOL FOR IMPROVING DATA COLLECTION

Biometric enrolment in the context of UNHCR's individual registration efforts is a technique that refers to the identification of persons of concern by their unique and measurable characteristics or traits – such as fingerprints. Since biometric identifiers are unique to individuals, they help UNHCR to verify and properly identify each individual of concern.

Biometrics compares fingerprint data of all individuals to detect when an individual attempts to register more than once. This is often referred to as double or multiple registrations

and can often happen in the confusion of an emergency.

The goal of biometric registration is to establish the unique identity of an individual at the time of initial registration. This is especially important in countries or operations where refugee populations pose certain statistical challenges. Each individual has a unique fingerprint. The use of biometric registration ensures that no multiple registrations occur.

As a result, protection and assistance are provided to those persons of

concern who presented themselves at the outset of the emergency.

In addition to eliminating double registration among refugees, the fingerprinting exercise also discouraged some Liberians from attempting to fraudulently register as refugees. Prior to the commencement of the biometric exercise in Liberia, a mass information campaign was undertaken during which refugees were informed about the process and Liberian nationals were requested not to register as refugees, as doing so may have adverse consequences on their rights as citizens.

BIOMETRIC REGISTRATION IN ACTION

Liberia's registration exercise initially started in seven camps (two in Nimba County, four in Grand Gedeh County and one in Maryland County). Once the exercise was completed in the camps, the operation moved to the relocation and host communities. All the partners, including the government and the other United Nations agencies operating in Liberia, were fully involved in the process of registration and biometric enrolment of refugees. Before each exercise, refugees were given prior notice with an emphasis on information sharing at least one week before the commencement of the biometric registration to sensitize the individuals of concern.

Biometric enrolment activities are typically combined with UNHCR's verification exercises during which detailed biographical information about

refugees including photographs are collected and verified. Generally, the inclusion of biometric enrolment takes more time when combined with refugee verification. The entire process requires detailed planning and substantial resources. Depending on the total refugee population in a given location, the exercise might require anywhere between 50 and 200 personnel.

The biometric enrolment in Liberia lasted from one to three weeks, depending on the total number of the refugee population and resources available at any given time. During the exercise, a biometrics fingerprint scanner was used to fingerprint the index fingers of both hands. The fingerprints collected were then instantly compared with other fingerprint data already collected to determine that no match already existed. If a match was

found, implying double registration, additional measures were taken to ensure that the individual concerned did not receive assistance more than once.

In each refugee camp where biometric registration was undertaken, the size of the registered refugee population was 40 to 50 per cent smaller than initial estimates. In some communities, the reduction was as much as 70 per cent.

In the case of Liberia, it is clear that the capture of biometric data acted not only as a deterrent to fraudulent activities but it also allowed UNHCR to ensure that persons of concern were properly identified in the emergency context. By eliminating multiple registrations by individuals, biometrics has helped to establish accurate population statistics and has gained credibility in UNHCR's emergency operations. ■

Population Levels and Trends

THIS CHAPTER analyses the major trends and changes in 2011 in the global populations for which UNHCR has a responsibility, including changes in the size, origin and flows of refugees, returnees, stateless persons and certain internally displaced persons - collectively referred to as “persons of concern” to UNHCR. Palestinian refugees who fall under the mandate of UNRWA are not included. This chapter only covers IDPs generated by conflict, and who benefited directly or indirectly from UNHCR’s protection and/or assistance activities.

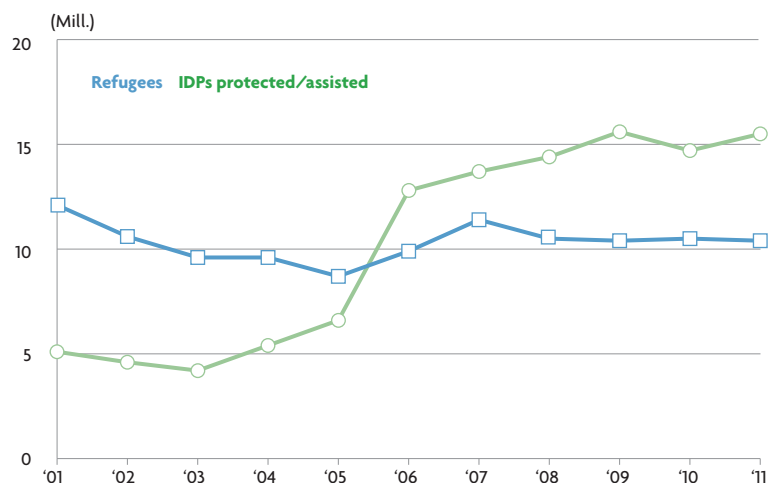
OVERVIEW OF GLOBAL TRENDS

By the end of 2011, the total population under UNHCR’s responsibility numbered 35.4 million persons, taking account of new displacement, durable solutions, legal and demographic changes, improved availability of data, and revised estimates. The analysis presented in the Yearbook is based on individual population groups.

By the end of 2011, there were 10.4 million refugees under UNHCR’s

responsibility, including some 604,000 people in refugee-like situations.³⁰ The number of people whose asylum applications had not yet been adjudicated by the end of the reporting period was estimated at 895,000. A total of 15.5 million IDPs, including more than 453,000 people in IDP-like situations, received humanitarian assistance under arrangements in which UNHCR was either a lead agency or a key partner. This was the second highest figure on record.

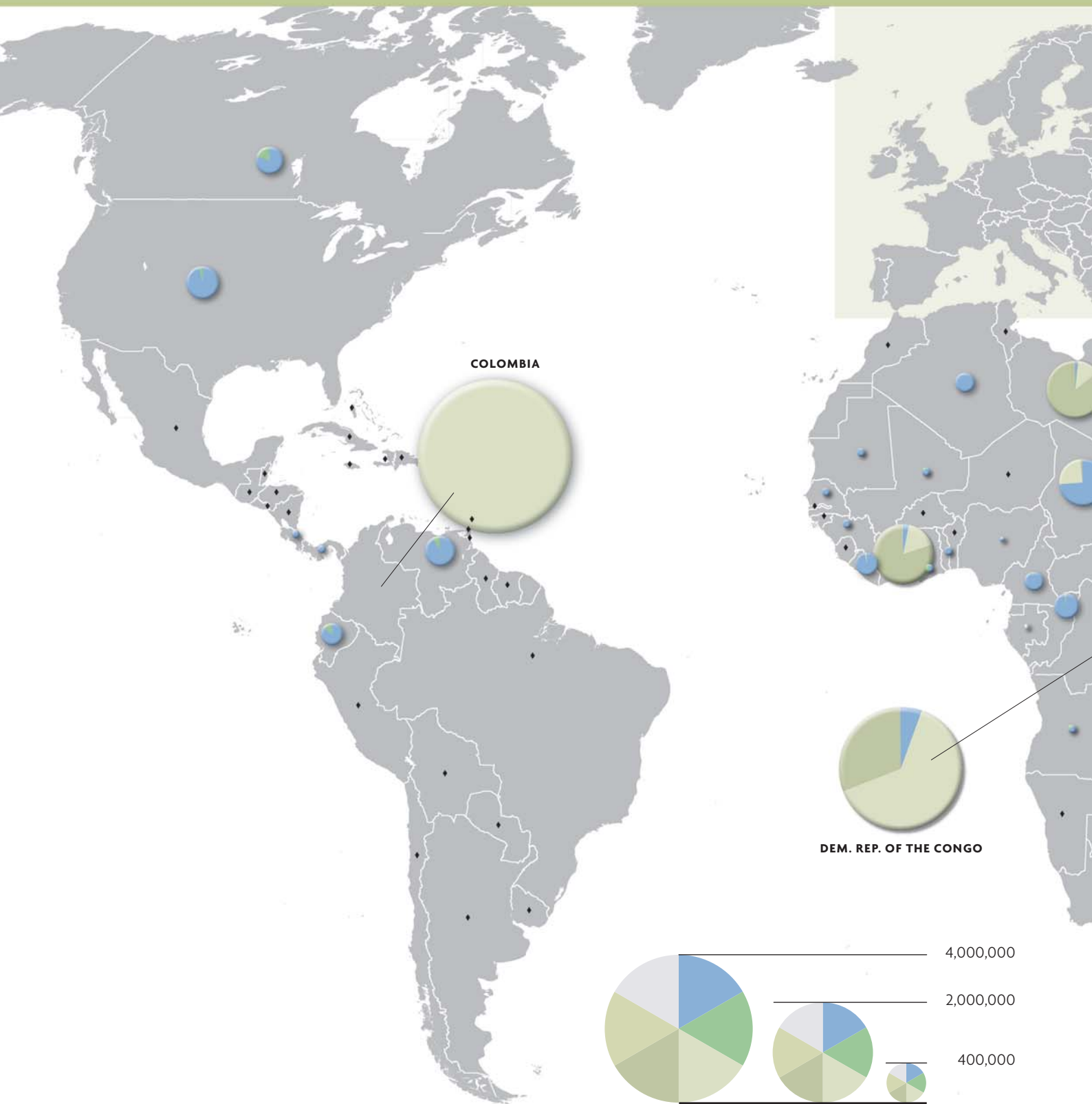
An estimated 3.2 million IDPs were able to return home during the year, the highest number in more than a

decade. Close to 532,000 refugees repatriated voluntarily in 2011, up from the 20-year low of 197,600 in 2010.

During 2011, UNHCR identified 3.5 million stateless persons in 64 countries and estimated the total number of stateless persons worldwide at three times that figure, or up to 12 million people.³¹ In addition, some 1.4 million individuals not included in these categories received protection and/or assistance from UNHCR based on humanitarian or other special grounds. These individuals are referred to as “other groups of people of concern”.

REFUGEES

Regions and countries of asylum

While the number of refugees under UNHCR's mandate increased in some regions, including in sub-Saharan Africa, and decreased in others, such as Asia and the Pacific, the global number of refugees remained essentially stable at 10.4 million, approximately 144,000 fewer than in 2010. Decreases occurred because of two main reasons. First, estimates for Afghan and Iraqi refugee populations in the Islamic Republic of Iran, Pakistan, and the Syrian Arab Republic were reduced by 16 per cent. Second, a number of refugees found durable solutions during the year, notably

voluntary repatriation. In some locations, however, there were significant increases in refugee numbers due to new or continued conflicts, as in Côte d'Ivoire, Libya and Somalia.

By the end of 2011, women and girls constituted slightly less than half (48%) of all refugees globally.³² Developing countries hosted 8.4 million refugees, or four-fifths of the global refugee population. The 48 Least Developed Countries provided asylum to 2.3 million refugees, 22 per cent of the total.³³

Table II.1 shows that 3.6 million or more than one-third (35%) of all refugees were residing in countries covered by UNHCR's Asia and Pacific region. Of these, 2.6 million were Afghans (71%). Sub-Saharan Africa was host to 2.7 million refugees or one quarter of the global population. They originated primarily from Somalia (760,800), Sudan (462,100), and the Democratic Republic of the Congo (457,900). The Middle East and North Africa region hosted 1.7 million refugees or 17 per cent of the total. They originated mainly from Iraq (some 1.2 million according to Government estimates). Europe hosted some 1.6 million refugees (15%). Refugees from Serbia (and Kosovo: S/RES/1244 (1999)) (159,000), Iraq (148,000), and Turkey (119,500) were the largest groups. The Americas region hosted the smallest share of the global refugee population (8%), with Colombians

(392,600)³⁴ constituting the largest number in this region.

A decrease in the number of refugees was observed in the Middle East and North Africa region, where figures dropped by 10 per cent during the reporting period, primarily the result of revised estimates. Estimates by the Government of the Syrian Arab Republic for the number of Iraqi refugees was revised downward by 250,000, based on the assumption that a number of Iraqis had left, either to return to Iraq or to other countries. Conversely, the armed conflict in Libya led to an estimated 150,000 Libyans fleeing, primarily to Tunisia. Almost all of them had returned to Libya by the end of the year. More than 27,000 Somali refugees arrived in Yemen during the year.

In sub-Saharan Africa, the number of refugees had declined for nine consecutive years between 2001 and 2009. In 2010, the trend reversed as the number of refugees rose, and this continued into 2011. By the end of 2011, there were close to 2.7 million refugees in sub-Saharan Africa, roughly half a million more than at the beginning of the year. However, the numbers remained below those of 2000

Most refugees remain within their region of origin

Available statistical evidence demonstrates that most refugees having fled to neighbouring countries, remain in the same region.

The major refugee-generating regions

hosted on average between 75 and 93 per cent of refugees from within the same region. UNHCR estimates that some 1.8 million refugees (17% of the total of 10.4 million) live outside their region of origin. ●

when more than 3.4 million people were refugees in the region.

Due to conflict, violence and drought in southern and central Somalia, close to 300,000 Somalis left their homes in 2011 and sought refuge abroad, mainly in Kenya (163,100) and Ethiopia (101,000). Overall, an estimated 700,000 Somalis have left their country during the past five years. Côte d'Ivoire witnessed a large-scale outflow of refugees in 2011, when an estimated 207,000 people fled mostly to Liberia (about 200,000), with smaller numbers arriving in Ghana and Guinea. With the gradual return of civil order from April 2011, more than 135,200 people were able to return to Côte d'Ivoire by the end of the year. Conflicts or human rights violations in Eritrea and Sudan led to new outflows of more than 127,500 refugees, primarily to South Sudan (76,800), Ethiopia (30,200), and Israel (15,300). In total some 236,000 refugees across sub-Saharan Africa were able to return home in safety and dignity, including to Côte d'Ivoire (135,200), Sudan (50,000), the Democratic Republic of the Congo (21,100),

the Central African Republic (9,000), and Rwanda (8,500).

IN THE AMERICAS, the refugee population remained virtually unchanged (+0.4%), at roughly 807,000. The United States of America was home to one third of refugees in this region according to UNHCR estimates (264,800).³⁵ Some 2,700 Colombians were granted refugee status in Ecuador bringing the total number of Colombian refugees (54,300) and people in a refugee-like situation (68,300) to 122,600 at the end of 2011. In the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela, the total number of Colombian refugees and persons in a refugee-like situation remained stable at about 202,000.

In the Asia and Pacific region, the total number of refugees, including people in a refugee-like situation, was estimated at 3.6 million at the end of 2011, a decrease of 10 per cent during the year. This was largely due to revised estimates of Afghan refugees in Pakistan and the Islamic Republic of Iran, following comprehensive registration exercises in both countries.

Protracted refugee situations

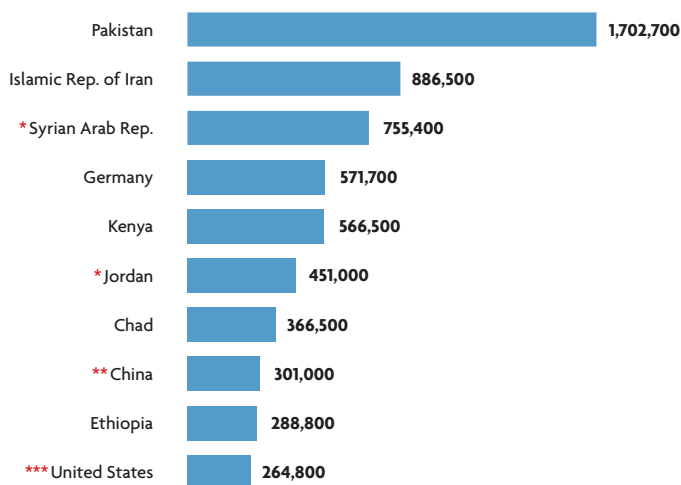
UNHCR defines a protracted refugee situation as one in which 25,000 or more refugees of the same nationality have been in exile for five years or longer in any given asylum country. Based on this definition, it is estimated that some 7.1 million refugees were in a protracted situation by the end of 2011. These refugees were living in 26 host countries accounting for an overall total of 31 protracted situations. ●

In Pakistan, the Afghan refugee estimate dropped from 1.9 to 1.7 million while in the Islamic Republic of Iran it went from slightly over 1 million at the start of 2011, to 840,500 by year-end. Voluntary repatriation of about 71,000 Afghans from both countries also contributed to these reductions.

In Europe, the refugee population decreased by 49,000 people to 1.56 million at the end of 2011 (-3%) largely as a result of revised estimates in Germany and in the United Kingdom. In Germany, the figure decreased from 594,300 at the start of 2011 to 571,700 by year-end. In the United Kingdom, UNHCR's estimate of the refugee population was revised downwards from 238,200 to 193,500, based on assumptions regarding the acquisition of citizenship by long-term recognised refugees.

With one exception, the 10 major refugee-hosting countries in 2011 were the same as in 2010. The United Kingdom dropped out of the top 10, and Ethiopia moved into ninth place [see Figure II.2]. Together, these 10 countries accounted for 59 per cent of all refugees under UNHCR's mandate. Over the past four years, the list of the top 10 refugee-hosting countries has remained largely unchanged (see Table II.2).

Fig. II.2 Major refugee hosting countries | end-2011

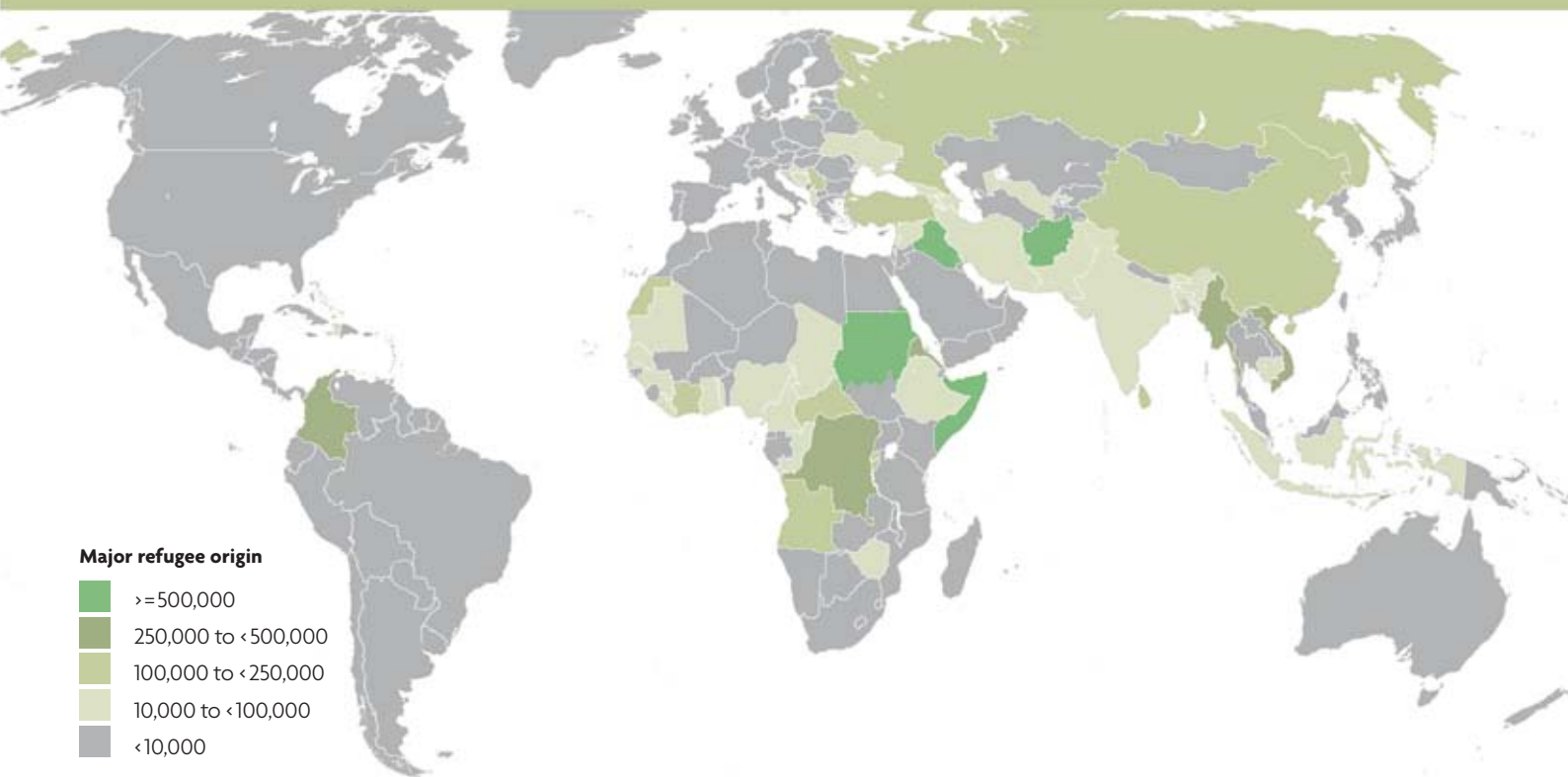

PAKISTAN CONTINUED to host the largest number of refugees (1.7 million), nearly all from Afghanistan, with a decrease of almost 200,000 in the total refugee population in the country. The decrease was partly due to a large number of registered Afghans not having renewed their Proof of Registration cards by 31 December 2011. The Islamic Republic of Iran hosted 886,500 refugees by year-end, again almost all Afghans. The Government decreased its refugee estimate by 187,000 people as a result of a re-registration exercise known as “Amayesh VII” for Afghan refugees. According to Government estimates, the Syrian Arab Republic was host to 750,000 Iraqi refugees, making it the third largest refugee-hosting country. The Government revised its 2011 figure by 25 per cent (-250,000 people), based on the assumption that a number of Iraqis had left the country. UNHCR had registered and was assisting 100,300 Iraqi refugees in the Syrian Arab Republic at the end of 2011.

Germany reported 571,700 refugees at the end of 2011, a decrease of 4 per cent (-22,600 people). Kenya was the fifth largest hosting country at the end of 2011 with 566,500 refugees.

The number of refugees in Kenya increased by 163,600 people during the year (+41%), mainly as a result of new arrivals from Somalia. From 2009 to 2011, 374,000 Somali refugees arrived in Kenya, stretching the capacity of the Dadaab and Kakuma refugee camps to the limit. In Jordan, the Government’s estimate of Iraqi refugees remained unchanged at 450,000, of whom UNHCR has registered and assisted 32,200. In Chad, the overall refugee population increased by 5 per cent to 366,500 by the end of 2011, partly due to new arrivals from Sudan. The country was the seventh

largest refugee-hosting country in the world.

Estimated refugee numbers in China remained unchanged from 2010. Ethiopia, meanwhile, witnessed large numbers of new arrivals in 2011. In 2008 Ethiopia had been host to 83,600 refugees, making it the 27th largest refugee-hosting country in the world at that time - the lowest level for Ethiopia in nearly three decades. Since 2008 refugee figures have more than tripled with the arrival of hundreds of thousands of Eritrean and Somali refugees. By the end of 2011, the refugee population had grown to

288,800 making Ethiopia host to the ninth largest refugee population in the world.

Contributions of host countries

The impact of hosting refugees should, in theory, be quantifiable in terms of the national and international protection and assistance provided, and of the contributions made by refugees to the host country. In practice, however, comprehensive and comparable data are not available to allow this calculation.

Countries with strong economies are more likely to be capable of absorbing and supporting refugees. By comparing the refugee population with the average income level of a country according to the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) (Purchasing Power Parity)³⁶ per capita³⁷, a statistical measure can be obtained of the relative weight of hosting refugees. If the number of refugees per 1 USD GDP (PPP) per capita is high, the relative contribution and effort made by countries compared to their national economy can also be considered high. The 20 countries with the largest number of refugees per 1 USD GDP per capita are all developing countries, and include 12 Least Developed Countries. Moreover, more than 4.7 million refugees, representing 45 per cent of the global total, resided in countries whose GDP (PPP) per capita was below USD 3,000.

At the end of 2011, Pakistan had the highest number of refugees compared to its national economy [see Figure II.3], hosting 605 refugees per 1 USD GDP (PPP) per capita. The Democratic Republic of the Congo was second with 399 refugees per 1 USD GDP (PPP) per capita, followed by Kenya (321), Liberia (290), Ethiopia (253), and Chad (211). The highest ranked developed country was Germany, in 26th place, with 15 refugees per 1 USD GDP (PPP) per capita.

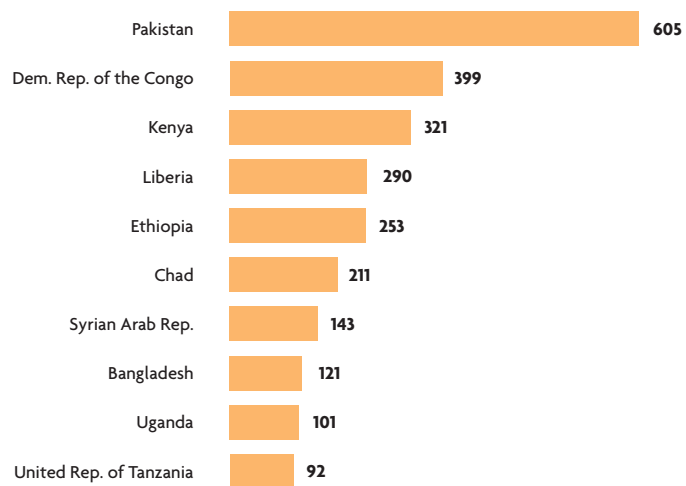
Origins

The 10 main countries of refugee origin in 2011 were the same as in 2010. Together, these countries accounted

for 79 per cent of all refugees under UNHCR's mandate. Over the past years, the list of the top 10 refugee countries of origin has fluctuated only marginally [see Table II.3].

Afghanistan remained the leading country of origin of refugees in 2011 with nearly 2.7 million refugees in 79 countries. On average, one out of every four refugees in the world was from Afghanistan, with 95 per cent of them in Pakistan and the Islamic Republic of Iran. Iraqis were the second largest refugee group, with an estimated 1.4 million having sought safety mainly in neighbouring countries.

Afghan and Iraqi refugees accounted for more than one-third (39%) of all refugees under UNHCR's responsibility worldwide. [see Map 2]

Somalis constituted the third largest group under UNHCR's responsibility, with almost 1.1 million people living as refugees at the end of 2011, three times as many as in 2004. As conditions in Somalia continued to deteriorate, particularly in the central and southern areas of the country, the combination of conflict, violence, drought, and famine caused more than 300,000 people to flee their country in 2011. More than half found shelter at the Dadaab refugee camps in Kenya. Others fled to

Ethiopia (101,000), Yemen (27,400), and Djibouti (5,700). In Dadaab, the development of new sites, registration, deliveries of emergency assistance and services continued throughout the year. As of October, violence against Kenyan security forces and humanitarian workers crippled the ability of aid agencies to deliver all but life-saving assistance such as food, water and health services.

Sudan was the fourth largest country of origin, with 500,000 refugees under UNHCR's mandate at the end of 2011. Fighting in southern areas of Sudan forced an estimated 102,000 people to flee the country during 2011, mainly to South Sudan (76,800) and Ethiopia (19,200). Many families left with few belongings and walked for weeks through the bush, stopping where there was water and moving on when the source ran dry. Some were stranded in heavily-forested areas bordering South Sudan.

Other main source countries of refugees were the Democratic Republic of the Congo (491,500), Myanmar (414,600), and Colombia (395,900). The number of Congolese refugees increased by about 14,700, mainly as a result of almost 8,000 asylum-seek-

ers being granted refugee status in Burundi and Uganda. The number of refugees from Myanmar and Colombia remained relatively stable compared to early 2011. For refugees from Myanmar, the figure includes an estimated 200,000 unregistered people in Bangladesh, while for Colombians, it includes refugees as well people in a refugee-like situation in Ecuador, the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela and Panama.

ASYLUM-SEEKERS

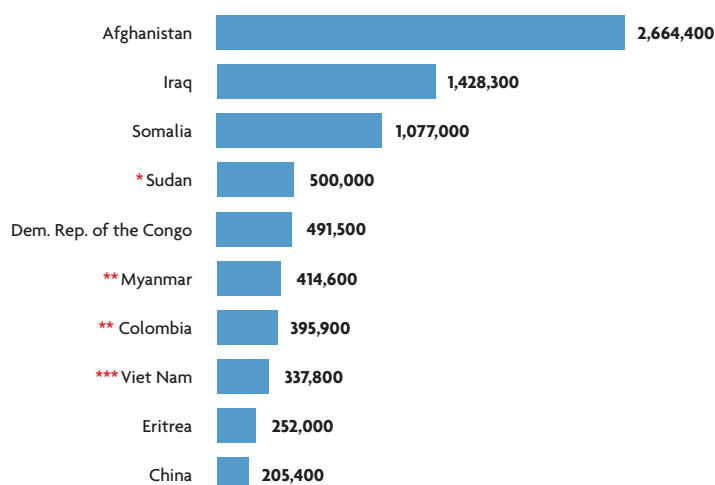
Those asylum-seekers that are included in the total population of concern to UNHCR are people who are awaiting a final decision on their applications for asylum or refugee status. The figures in this chapter refer to claimants whose applications were pending as of the end of 2011, irrespective of when they were lodged, and may include undecided or pending cases from previous years.³⁸

Worldwide, at least 895,300 individuals were still awaiting a decision on their asylum claims at the end of 2011. They included people at all stages of the asylum process. Despite improved reporting in recent years, the global number of undecided cases presented here is incomplete as some countries, particularly in the industrialized world, do not report these figures.

INTERNALLY DISPLACED PERSONS

The global number of conflict-generated IDPs at the end of 2011 was estimated at some 26.4 million.³⁹ The number of IDPs, including people in IDP-like situations⁴⁰ who benefited

* May include citizens of South Sudan (in absence of separate statistics for both countries).

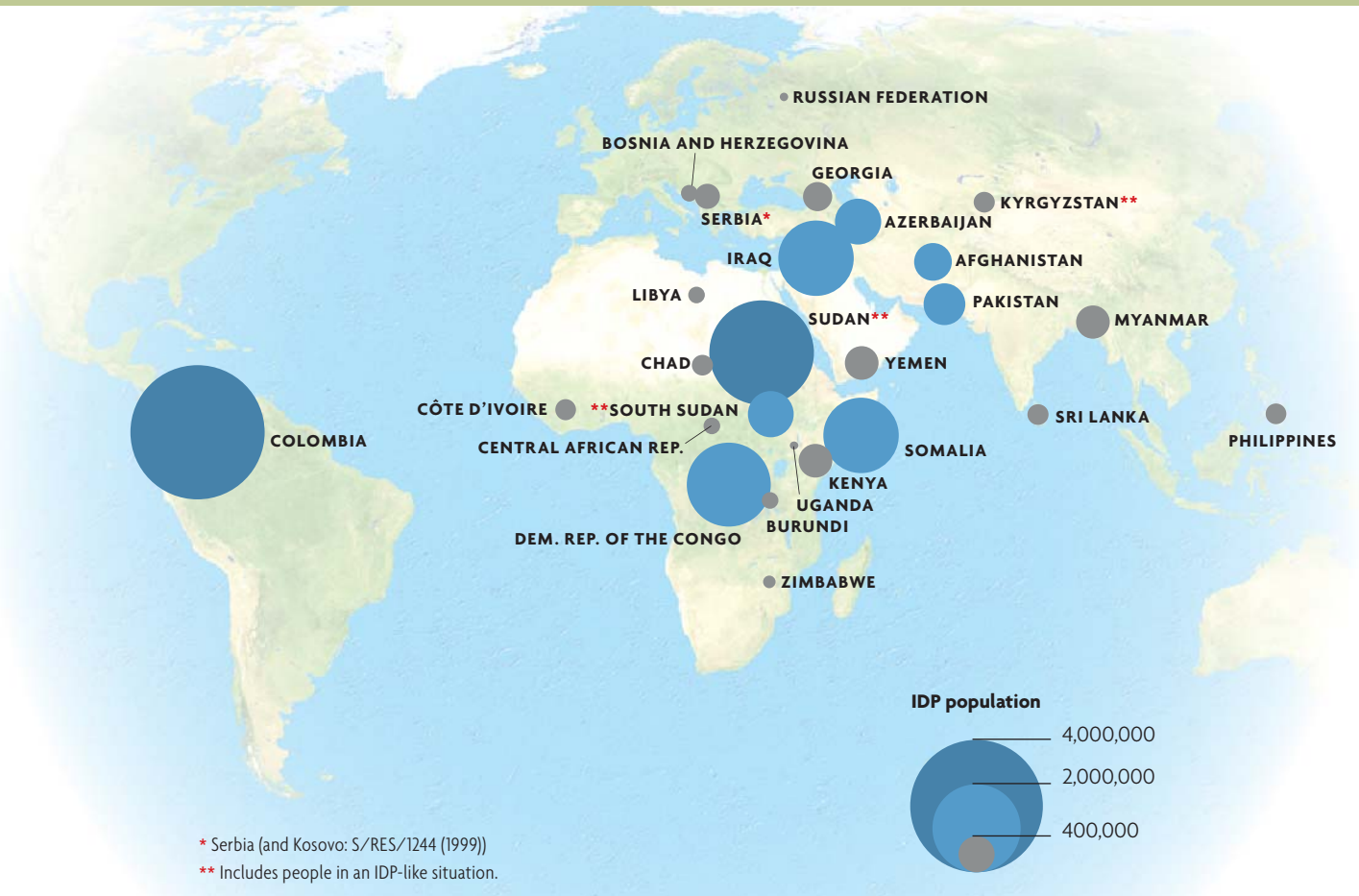

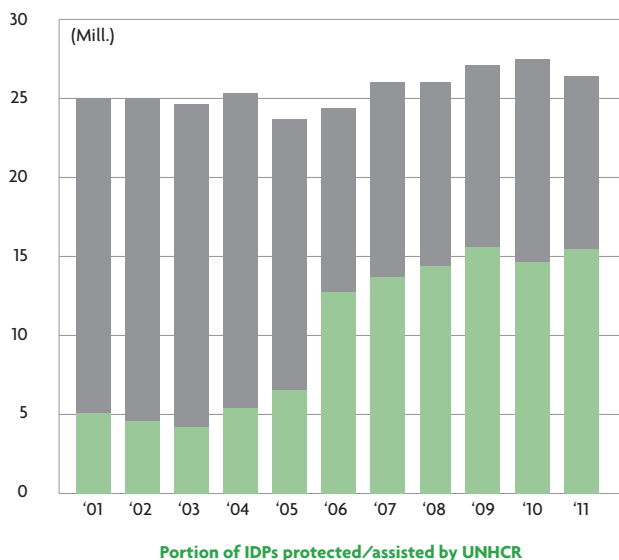
from UNHCR’s protection and assistance activities stood at almost 15.5 million at the end of 2011. This was the second highest figure on record, and almost 800,000 more than at the end of 2010 (14.7 million). The increase was partly due to new or renewed displacement

occurring in Afghanistan, Côte d’Ivoire, Libya, South Sudan, Sudan, and Yemen. UNHCR offices reported at least 2.9 million newly-displaced people in 2011. More than 3.2 million IDPs returned home during the reporting period - the highest

number in 15 years. Of the countries where UNHCR was engaged with IDPs in 2011, returns were highest in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (822,700), Pakistan (620,400), Côte d’Ivoire (466,800), and Libya (458,000). UNHCR statistics at the end of 2011 included IDP populations in a total of 26 countries.

In Colombia, where Government registration of IDPs began in 1997, more than 3.8 million IDPs were reported as registered by the end of 2011.⁴¹ Escalating violence in Côte d’Ivoire displaced an estimated one million people during the year, while the uprising in Libya displaced more than half a million people within the country. In both countries, hundreds of thousands of IDPs were able to return to their place of habitual residence during the year, reducing the estimated number of IDPs protected/assisted by UNHCR to 126,700 in Côte d’Ivoire and 93,600 in Libya.

THE NUMBER OF IDPS protected or assisted by UNHCR in Sudan was approximately 2.4 million⁴² by the end of the year. In Somalia, the IDP figure stood at an estimated 1.4 million. In the newly-independent Republic of South Sudan, an estimated 350,000 people were displaced in 2011, due to fighting. The number of IDPs protected/assisted by UNHCR, including that of persons in an IDP-like situation, stood at 560,200 at the end of the year. Renewed conflict and security concerns displaced 212,000 people in Afghanistan in 2011; by the end of the year, the number of IDPs was estimated at almost 447,500, compared to 351,900 in 2010. (see Annex Table 6)

In Yemen, internal displacement continued as tens of thousands of civilians fled tribal clashes in the north and renewed fighting between government troops and militant groups in the south. As a consequence, the number of IDPs protected/assisted by UNHCR in the country nearly doubled to 347,000.

In Pakistan, although more than 620,000 IDPs were able to return home in 2011, an estimated 453,000 remained displaced within the country at year-end. In the Democratic Republic of the Congo, more than 822,000 IDPs returned to their homes in 2011; however, at the end of the year the number of IDPs remained high (1.7 million) as a result of renewed conflict.⁴³

Some 96,000 IDPs in Uganda were able to return to their villages in the course of the year, reducing the IDP population remaining in camps and transit sites to less than 30,000, and marking the end of UNHCR's assistance to displaced people in the country. At the conflict's peak in 2005, caused by fighting between the Ugandan army and the rebel Lord's Resistance Army, there had been 1.84 million IDPs living in 251 camps across 11 districts of northern Uganda.

STATELESS PERSONS

Identifying stateless persons remains key to addressing their difficulties, and to enabling UNHCR to fulfil its statelessness mandate. This responsibility includes the prevention and reduction of statelessness and the protection of stateless persons, and involves informing the international community of the magnitude of statelessness around the world. Measuring statelessness is complicated by the very nature of the phenomenon. Stateless people often live in a precarious situation on the margins of society, frequently lacking identity documentation, and subject to discrimination. Only a minority of countries have procedures in place for the identification, registration and documentation of stateless persons.

In December 2011, UNHCR convened a Ministerial Intergovernmental Event on Refugees and Stateless Persons to commemorate the 60th anniversary of the 1951 Convention relating to the Status of Refugees and the 50th anniversary of the 1961 Convention on the Reduction of Statelessness. Many States used this occasion to pledge their accession to one or both of the 1954 and 1961 Statelessness Conventions, to establish statelessness determination procedures, and to improve levels of birth registration and civil documentation in order to prevent and reduce statelessness. In addition, a number of States expressed their commitment to improve data collection on stateless populations. Nine States specifically pledged to map stateless populations within their respective territories in the context of carrying out a national population census or through dedicated surveys and studies. UNHCR has already begun to see the results of the 2010 World Population and Housing

Census Programme⁴⁴ in providing information that is crucial to determine the magnitude of statelessness.⁴⁵

The statistics in the Yearbook only include data on countries for which reliable official statistics or estimates of stateless populations were available. Annex table 7 includes some countries (marked with an asterisk) for which UNHCR has information about the existence of significant stateless populations but for which no reliable figures were available. They include the Dominican Republic, India and Indonesia.

Following a gradual expansion in data coverage and awareness of state-

less persons in recent years, the quality of data improved somewhat in 2011, but the number of countries reporting statelessness figures did not increase. By the end of 2011, statistics on stateless populations were available for 64 countries, compared to the 30 countries reporting these figures in 2004, when UNHCR first started systematically collecting statistics on stateless populations. For 2011, UNHCR offices reported an identified 3.5 million stateless persons, a figure comparable to that reported in 2010.

RETURNEES (REFUGEES AND IDPS)⁴⁶

Voluntary repatriation (for refugees) and voluntary return (for IDPs) remain the durable solution sought by the largest numbers of persons displaced by conflict. As a result of enhanced efforts to provide durable solutions, 532,000 refugees repatriated voluntar-

ily during 2011, more than double the figure for 2010 (197,600). Yet, 2011 saw the third lowest number of voluntarily repatriated refugees in a decade. More than 3.2 million IDPs were able to return - the highest number in more than a decade.

Other groups or people of concern

OTHER GROUPS OR PEOPLE OF CONCERN

UNHCR extended its protection or assistance activities to individuals whom it considers “of concern”, but who do not fall into any of the above population categories. These activities were based on humanitarian or other special grounds, and included asylum-seekers rejected by States, but whom UNHCR deemed to be in need of humanitarian assistance or otherwise of its concern. The number of people in this category was 1.4 million by year-end, of whom two-thirds were Afghans. These were former refugees who returned to Afghanistan prior to 2011 but who had been unable to reintegrate due to the difficult economic situation, the lack of comprehensive reintegration measures, and poor security. Many of these individuals continued to benefit from UNHCR’s assistance. ■

3 Durable Solutions and New Displacement

WHILE UNHCR'S primary purpose⁴⁷ is to safeguard the rights and well-being of refugees, the organization's ultimate goal is to help find durable solutions that will allow them to rebuild their lives in dignity. There are three durable solutions pursued by UNHCR for refugees: voluntary repatriation; local integration; or resettlement to a third country. There is no hierarchy among the three durable solutions. While voluntary repatriation has been pursued in many situations, resettlement or local integration is the only durable solution in some.

Despite the efforts of the international community and UNHCR, for

millions of refugees such solutions are nowhere in sight. Of the three durable solutions, voluntary repatriation has benefited the largest number of refugees over the years. While this remains the preferred solution among most of the world's refugees, persistent conflict, fear of persecution or lack of basic services in the areas of return often prevent them from returning to their countries of origin. For some refugees, resettlement to a third country is the only way to find permanent safety and the enjoyment of fundamental human rights. Local integration is a complex and gradual process, involving legal, economic and socio-cultural dimensions. In many cases, acquiring the nationality of the

country of asylum is the culmination of this process. Local integration as a process is difficult to measure in numerical terms, given the variety of legal and practical forms it can take. The analysis of local integration data is therefore limited, and subject to the availability of statistics on the naturalization of refugees in host countries.

Efforts and progress towards achieving durable solutions are, however, partly hampered by new outflows of refugees. Each year, thousands of refugees flee their home country and are recognized either on an individual or *prima facie* basis. This chapter looks at both durable solutions achieved, and at new displacements that occurred in 2011.

DURABLE SOLUTIONS

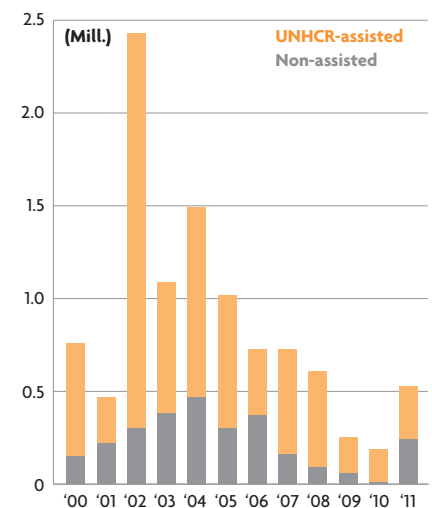
○ Voluntary repatriation⁴⁸

The number of refugees returning home voluntarily has fallen steadily since 2004. This trend was reversed in 2011, with an estimated 532,000 refugees repatriating during the year.⁴⁹ This was more than double the figure

(+169%) in 2010 (197,600), and the highest since 2008, when 604,000 refugees repatriated. Despite this sharp increase, the number of repatriating refugees in 2011 was the third lowest in a decade. Globally, more than 9.1 million refugees have returned home over the past 10 years, three-quarters of them with UNHCR assistance.

For 2011, the main countries of return included Libya (149,000), Côte d'Ivoire (135,200), Afghanistan (71,100), Iraq (67,100), Sudan (50,100), and the Democratic Republic of the Congo (21,100). The largest number of refugee departures was reported by Tunisia (149,000), followed by Liberia (135,100), Pakistan (52,100),

Chad (37,400), and the Islamic Republic of Iran (36,900). In the case of Libya and Côte d'Ivoire, the return took place less than a year after the flight.

For the first time since 2009, Afghanistan was not the country with the highest number of returning refugees. Overall, more than 5.5 million afghan refugees—or roughly one-fifth of Afghanistan's population—have returned home since 2002, most of them with UNHCR's assistance. With 71,100 registered returns during the year, levels in 2011 were the second lowest since large-scale returns began in 2002.

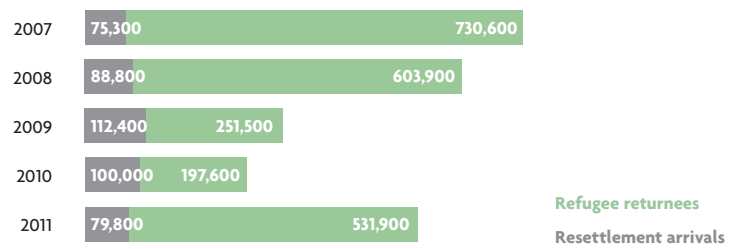
Iraq reported the highest number of refugee returns since 2004, when 194,000 persons returned. In 2011, figures reached 67,100, more than double those of 2010 (28,900). This increase could be the result of a government decision to increase the amount of funds allocated to returnees, an improvement in security and a reduction in sectarian violence. Overall, more than half a million iraqis returned home between 2003 and 2011.

Resettlement

Resettlement continued to play a vital role as an essential component of comprehensive frameworks for durable solutions. It also constituted an important protection tool, and an international responsibility-sharing mechanism.

Resettlement benefits a comparatively small number of refugees: in 2011, less than 1 per cent of the world's refugees benefited from this durable solution. Over the past five years, some 455,000 refugees were resettled compared to 2.3 million refugees

who repatriated. For every refugee resettled since 2007, approximately five have repatriated. In recent years, UNHCR and States have worked to increase the use of resettlement as a strategic durable solution – serving to resolve some protracted refugees situations, to create protection space, and to open up solutions that might otherwise have remained closed.

Worldwide, the resettlement base expanded to 26 countries in 2011. The adoption of the Joint European Union (EU) Resettlement Scheme⁵⁰ is expected to enhance the number of resettlement places available in EU Member States. However, the number of resettlement places offered by States has not significantly increased over the years, and has remained at around 80,000. Global resettlement placement needs, assessed at some 800,000, thus exceeded the number of places available by a ratio of 1:10.

In 2011, UNHCR submitted some 92,000 refugees for resettlement. Ten per cent of all submissions were for women and girls at risk, the highest percentage of the last six years. Overall, submission levels declined, due to the time involved in process-

ing complex cases and to UNHCR's decision to contain submission levels to avoid the accumulation of pending cases for certain refugee populations which are unable to depart.

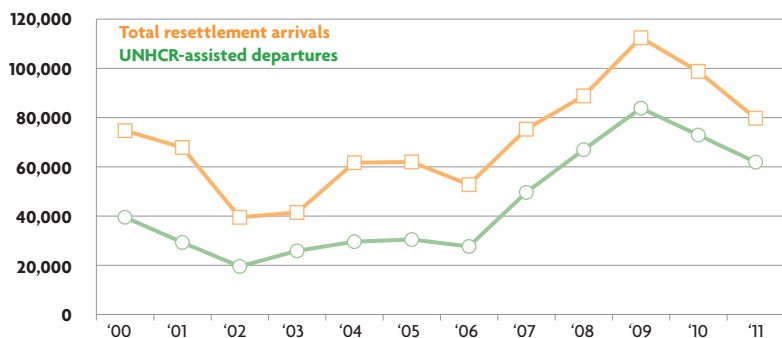
During the year, a total of 79,800 refugees were admitted by 22 resettlement countries, including the United States of America (51,500),⁵¹ Canada (12,900), Australia (9,200), Sweden (1,900), and Norway (1,300). Overall, this was almost 20,000 people less than in 2010 (98,800). The United States of America and Canada together admitted four-fifths of all resettled refugees in 2011.

For purposes of comparison, the 22 countries resettling refugees during 2011 accepted more than 100 different nationalities. The largest groups were refugees from Myanmar (18,000), Bhutan (18,000), Iraq (13,700), Somalia (5,500), and Eritrea (3,700).

Of those resettled in 2011, almost 62,000 individuals departed with UNHCR's assistance—14 per cent less than in 2010. This sharp decrease was due to tightened security screening affecting Iraqi and Somali refugees in particular, and to a lack of access by resettlement selection missions to major processing countries (Syrian Arab Republic, Kenya) for security and safety reasons.⁵²

By nationality, the main beneficiaries of the UNHCR-facilitated resettlement

programmes in 2011 were refugees from Bhutan (18,000), Myanmar (17,900), Iraq (8,900), and Somalia (4,800).

UNHCR offices in 83 countries of asylum were involved in facilitating resettlement processing during 2011. The largest number of refugees resettled with UNHCR's assistance departed from Nepal (18,100), Thailand (9,600), Malaysia (8,400), the Syrian Arab Republic (4,700), and Turkey (4,400). Combined, these five UNHCR offices accounted for 7 out of every 10 resettlement departure assisted by the organization in 2011.

Local integration

Measuring the degree and nature of local integration in quantitative terms has remained a challenge. In instances where refugees acquired citizenship through naturalization, statistics are often limited by the fact that many of the countries concerned make no distinction between the naturalization of refugees and that of others. National laws in many countries do not permit refugees to be naturalized. Hence, the naturalization

of refugees tends to be restricted and, where feasible, under-reported.

Nevertheless, the limited data on the naturalization of refugees available to UNHCR show that during the past decade at least 900,000 refugees have been granted citizenship by their asylum country. The united states of america alone accounted for two-thirds of this figure.⁵³ In 2011, UNHCR was informed of refugees being granted citizenship in 25 countries, including Belgium (1,200), Ireland (1,100), Viet Nam (940), Armenia (420), and Georgia (230).

NEW DISPLACEMENT

This section is limited to individuals who have been recognized as refugees on a group or prima facie basis. Those who have sought asylum on an individual basis, by requesting refugee or complementary protection status through an individual asylum claim, will be discussed in Chapter IV.⁵⁴

More than 800,000 refugees became displaced as part of a mass outflow in 2011; the highest number in more than a decade. Somalia,

Côte d'Ivoire, Libya and Sudan were the principal source countries of new displacements. From Somalia, nearly 300,000 individuals fled the country primarily to Kenya (163,100) and Ethiopia (101,000). Côte d'Ivoire witnessed a large-scale outflow of refugees in 2011, when an estimated 207,000 people fled mostly to Liberia (about 200,000), with smaller numbers arriving in Ghana and Guinea. Some 150,000 libyan refugees sought safety in Tunisia during the year whereas the majority of the 101,000 newly displaced Sudanese refugees fled to South Sudan (76,800) and Ethiopia (19,200).

Although the total number of people who left Iraq during the year is not available, approximately 34,600 newly registered Iraqis were recorded by UNHCR in Jordan, Lebanon, the Syrian Arab Republic and other countries in the region in 2011.

Overall, the largest numbers of new refugee arrivals were reported by Liberia (200,000), Kenya (163,100), Tunisia (150,000), Ethiopia (131,200), and South Sudan (76,800).

IN FOCUS: EMERGENCY RESETTLEMENT INITIATIVE FOR THE CRISIS IN LIBYA

In February 2011, in response to political unrest in Libya and the subsequent mass movement of people into Tunisia and Egypt, UNHCR established a presence in Ras Djir at the Tunisian-Libyan border and in Salloum at the Egyptian-Libyan border. By the end of march, an estimated 200,000 people had crossed into Tunisia and Egypt. This population consisted of Egyptian and Libyan nationals, as well as migrant workers from third countries who were employed in Libya before the unrest. Also among the arrivals were persons of concern to UNHCR, such as those who had already been granted refugee status in Libya prior to crossing

the border as well as other individuals seeking international protection.

In response to the crisis, in april 2011 UNHCR launched the global resettlement solidarity initiative in Tunisia and Egypt to garner support for resettlement solutions for non-Libyan refugees reaching the borders of Egypt and Tunisia. Under the initiative, UNHCR resettlement teams were deployed to both countries to screen and process from among those present at the border cases for resettlement.

UNHCR also asked resettlement countries to increase the number of resettlement spaces offered, or to allocate spaces for the Libya situation within existing quotas. A number of resettlement countries subsequently allocated spaces from within their existing quotas to the Libya unrest. Those included Australia, Belgium, Canada, Denmark, Finland, Ireland, the Netherlands, Norway, Portugal,

Spain, and Sweden. Germany signalled that it would also consider cases.

The use of UNHCR's emergency transit centres (ETCs) in Romania and Slovakia has proven to be critical in facilitating and expediting resettlement from the border areas. Throughout the crisis, the United States of America, Canada, and the Nordic countries used the etcs as transit points while the resettlement process was completed. In 2011, 159 persons were evacuated from Shousha and Salloum to the ETC in Romania for onward resettlement to third countries.

By the end of 2011, UNHCR had submitted 3,000 individuals for resettlement from Tunisia and 1,300 from Salloum, Egypt, of which by the end of 2011 over 700 had departed to their new resettlement country or the ETC for onward processing. Refugees from Sudan, Eritrea, and Somalia made up the majority of submissions. ■

4 Asylum and Refugee Status Determination

THIS CHAPTER PRESENTS main the trends in individual asylum applications lodged in 2011, with an overview of decisions. It does not include information on mass influxes of refugees nor on those granted refugee status on a group or *prima facie* basis.⁵⁵

As part of internationally recognized obligations to protect refugees on their territories, countries are responsible for determining whether an asylum-seeker is a refugee or not. This responsibility is derived from the 1951 Convention relating to the

Status of Refugees and relevant regional instruments, and is often incorporated into national legislation.

In countries where national asylum systems are not in place or where states are unable or unwilling to assess asylum claims, UNHCR may conduct refugee status determination under its mandate. This chapter includes a special section on challenges relating to UNHCR refugee status determination (RSD) operations in the context of emergencies. It also provides an overview of recent trends with respect to unaccompanied and separated children.

Who is an asylum-seeker?

An asylum-seeker is an individual who has sought international protection and whose claim for refugee status has not yet been determined. ●

Although the terms “asylum” and “refugee status” are sometimes used interchangeably, asylum can only be granted by States. While UNHCR may recognize refugee status under its mandate, it cannot provide asylum.

Responsibility for refugee status determination

In 2011, 171 countries or territories reported RSD statistics to UNHCR, as opposed to 148 in 2002. This increase is mainly due to the addition of a number of Caribbean and Pacific islands.

Of the 171 reporting countries or territories, States were solely responsible for carrying out refugee status determination in 94 countries (55%). UNHCR was the only responsible body for RSD in 54 countries (32%). A shared responsibility was reported for 23 countries (13%). This included RSD procedures implemented jointly by UNHCR and governments as well as

RSD procedures implemented in parallel by UNHCR.⁵⁶

It is UNHCR's objective to strengthen states' capacity to conduct refugee status determination. Over recent years UNHCR has handed over the responsibility for assessing asylum claims to a number of states.

While in 2002 UNHCR was responsible for assessing asylum claims in 56 countries, this number had gradually dropped to 46 in 2010. In 2011, however, a reversing trend was observed with the number of countries where UNHCR conducts RSD having increased to 54.

⁵⁵ The decision not to record in asylum statistics people who were granted refugee status under UNHCR's mandate on a *prima facie* basis has been made to allow a direct comparison between State and UNHCR refugee status determination procedures. It should be noted, however, that UNHCR procedures that provide for refugee status recognition on a *prima facie* basis generally go beyond the mere registration of applicants and usually involve screening and interviewing to establish the nationality of the applicants, the absence of likely reasons for exclusion and the identification of specific protection needs.

Unaccompanied and separated children seeking asylum

Collecting accurate and reliable statistics on unaccompanied or separated children (UASC) seeking asylum is critical given the special protection and assistance needs. Since 2006, UNHCR has systematically collected data on UASC claiming asylum including their age, sex and country of origin (the latter since 2007). Despite these efforts, the global number of UASC who annually submit individual asylum claims remains unknown. One of the reasons for the lack of global data on UASC relates to the lack of proper registration mechanisms in place to identify UASC who seek international protection. Where they do exist, data may not be disaggregated by sex and age. In addition, UASC may not be aware or adequately informed of the possibility to seek asylum.

If authorities have doubts about the age declared by the asylum-seeking child, they might initiate age assessments. However, these procedures bear a level of uncertainty and can therefore not be considered as fully conclusive. Major receiving countries of asylum-seekers such as Canada, South Africa, and the United States of America do not provide information on UASC seeking asylum. These various factors impede the collection and comparison of global data.

The available data indicate that 17,700 individual asylum applications were lodged by UASC in 69 countries in 2011. This constituted about 4 per cent of the total number of asylum claims lodged in those countries, and was consistent with the percentage

observed in 2009 and 2010 (4% each). In absolute terms, however, the number of UASC seeking asylum increased compared to 2010 (15,600 claims in 69 countries), consistent with the overall increase in the global number of asylum-seekers recorded. Europe received 13,300 or three-quarters of the 17,700 UASC claims. Sweden and Germany registered the greatest number of UASC asylum claims in Europe, with 2,700 and 2,100 UASC claims respectively. Belgium and the United Kingdom were other important recipients of UASC applications, with 1,600 and 1,300 UASC claims. Outside Europe, Kenya and Indonesia were among the most significant destination countries for UASC, with 1,200 and 580 asylum claims.

The available information indicates that 5,200 unaccompanied or separated children were recognized in 2011 as refugees or granted a complementary form of protection. Despite a significantly higher number of UASC applications, this figure was lower than in 2010 (5,400 positive grants) and 2009 (7,700 positive grants). Europe accounted for 58 per cent of all positive decisions rendered in 2011.

The available information on the country of origin of UASC confirmed the trend observed in previous years with mainly Afghan and Somali children applying for asylum. These two nationalities accounted for almost half of all UASC claims in 2011. ●

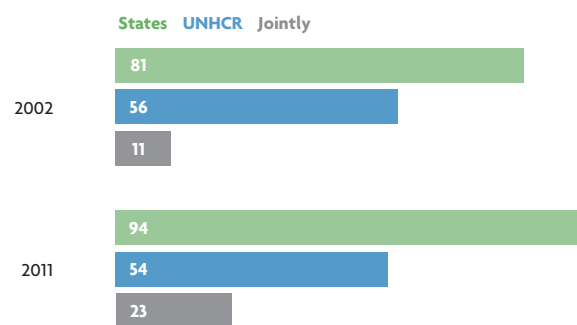
Global trends

APPLICATIONS

During 2011, some 876,100 individual applications for asylum or refugee status were submitted to Governments or UNHCR offices in 171 countries or territories. This constituted a 3 per cent increase compared to the previous year (850,300 claims) and was in line with increases observed in industrialized countries in 2011.⁵⁷ Of the provisional total of 876,100 asylum claims, an estimated 738,200 were initial applications⁵⁸ lodged at first instance while the remaining 137,900 claims were submitted at second instance, including with courts or other appellate bodies.⁵⁹

UNHCR offices registered some 98,800 individual applications out of the provisional total of 876,100 claims in 2011, slightly more than the previous year (96,800). The Office's share in

the global number of applications registered remained stable at 11 per cent.

Europe remained the primary destination for asylum-seekers with 423,100 individual asylum claims registered. It was followed by Africa (216,700).⁶⁰ These two regions accounted for 48 and 25 per cent respectively of all claims. The Americas and Asia registered 128,500 and 91,800 individual claims respectively, and Oceania received 15,900 asylum-seekers. Figures include applicants who were

unsuccessful at first instance, and subsequently filed an appeal.

With close to 107,000 new asylum claims registered in 2011, South Africa was the top destination for new asylum-seekers for the fourth successive year, accounting for almost one-tenth of all individual applications worldwide. Although the 2011 figure was 69 per cent lower than in 2010 (180,600 claims), it was twice that of 2006 when a mere 53,400 individuals had sought international protection there. Between 2006 and 2011, South Africa registered more than 816,000 new asylum applications, making it by far the top destination for asylum-seekers for this six-year period. Zimbabweans accounted for more than half of claims submitted in South Africa during this period – close to half a million asylum applications. In 2011, Zimbabweans again accounted for half of all asylum claims registered in South Africa (51,000 applications).

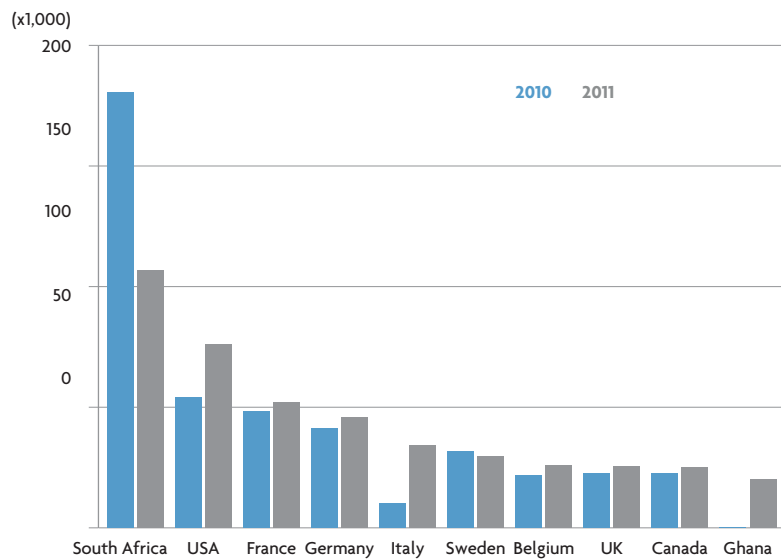
The United States of America received an estimated 76,000 asylum claims in 2011.⁶¹ This number represented an increase of 40 per cent in 2011 over 2010 (54,400). Asylum-seekers from China (+20%), Mexico (+94%) and India (+241%) primarily accounted for this increase. Almost half of all asylum claims in the country were lodged by asylum-seekers from China (26%), Mexico (14%), or El Salvador (7%).

France was the third largest recipient of asylum claims in 2011 (52,100),

recording an 8 per cent increase compared to 2010 (48,100) – the fourth consecutive yearly rise. The increase was partly due to a doubling of the number of asylum claims from Armenians: from 1,800 in 2010 to more than 3,600 claims in 2011. Similarly, asylum claims from citizens of Côte d'Ivoire during the same period tripled, from 530 in 2010 to almost 1,700 in 2011. The Russian Federation was the top country of origin of asylum-seekers in France, with some 4,000 asylum claims registered in 2011, followed by the Democratic Republic of the Congo (3,800 claims) and Armenia (3,600 claims).

Germany was the fourth-highest ranking country for new asylum-seekers in 2011, with more than 45,700 registered asylum claims. This was an 11 per cent increase compared to 2010 (41,300 claims), and the highest since 2003 (50,600 claims). The increase in 2011 was partly the result of higher numbers of asylum-seekers from Afghanistan (+32%), the Syrian Arab Republic (+77%), and Pakistan (+202%). Afghanistan was also the top country of origin of asylum-seekers in Germany, with 7,800 claims registered in 2011. On average, three out of ten applications in the country were lodged by Afghans.

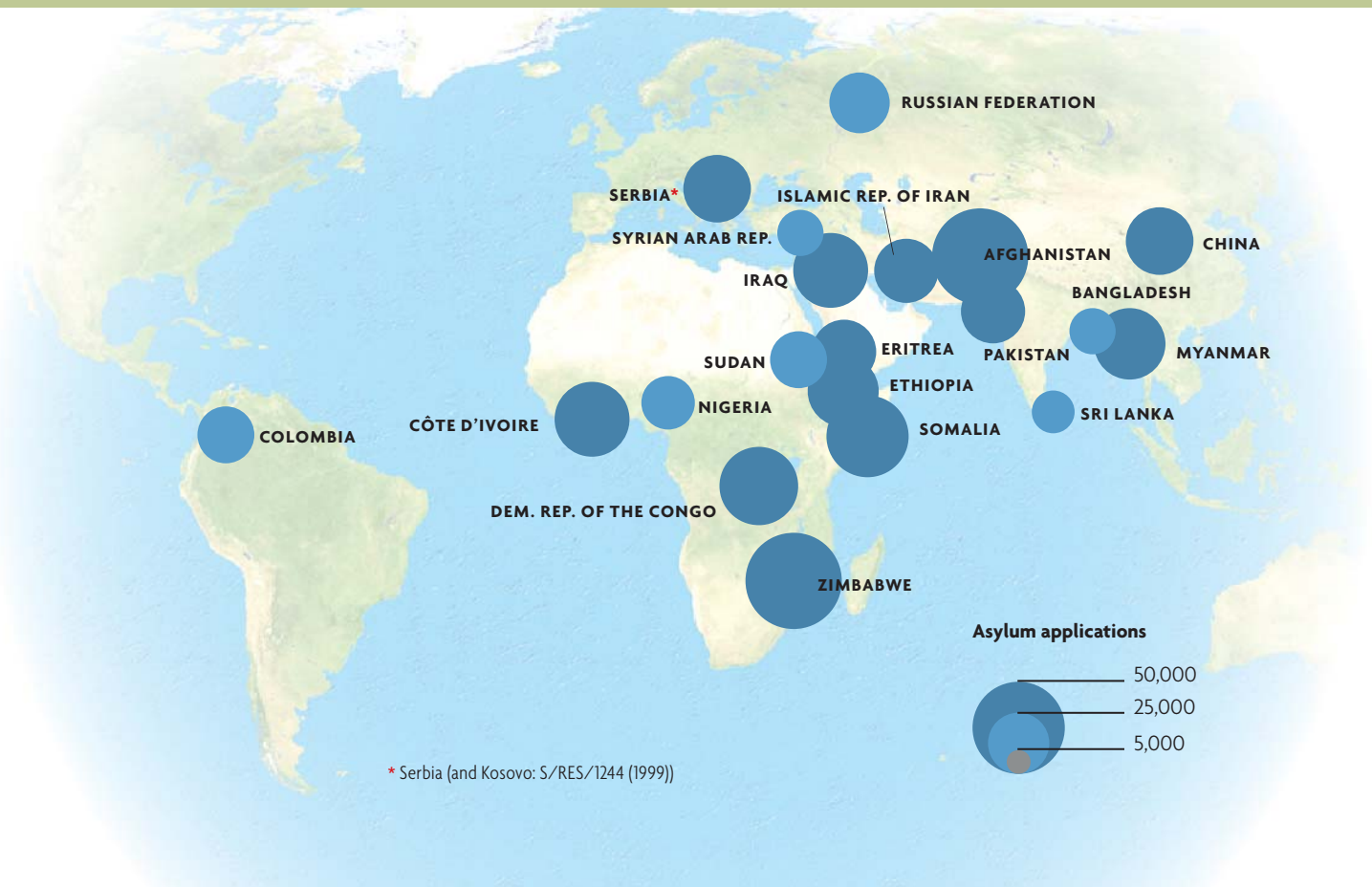

In Italy, following significantly increased numbers of new asylum applicants in 2008 (30,300 claims), many of them arriving by sea, the number of people requesting international protection there declined to a five-year low in 2010 (10,000 claims). In 2011, however, this trend was reversed with an estimated 34,100 asylum applications registered (+240%). This figure,

linked to a large extent to upheaval in North Africa in 2010-2011, constituted an all-time record for Italy, making it the fifth largest recipient of asylum claims worldwide in 2011. Nigeria remained the main country of origin of asylum-seekers, with 6,200 claims registered (up from 1,400 a year earlier), followed by Tunisia (4,600 claims) and Ghana (3,100 claims). Other important destination countries for asylum-seekers were Sweden (29,600), Belgium (26,000), the United Kingdom (25,500), Canada (25,000),⁶² and Ghana (20,100).

In 2011, UNHCR offices registered 80,100 new individual applications for refugee status and 18,700 on appeal or for review. The office in Turkey received the largest number of new requests (16,000). Malaysia received the second largest (15,700 new claims), followed by Yemen (5,400), Egypt (5,200), Jordan (4,600), and Tunisia (4,500). Among the countries listed in *Table IV.2*, Offices in Turkey, Jordan, Yemen, Egypt and Tunisia faced an increase in applications while those in Malaysia, Cameroon and the Syrian

Arab Republic experienced a decrease. In India and Indonesia, levels remained relatively stable. The top five receiving UNHCR offices registered 59 per cent of all new individual asylum claims registered by the organization in 2011. Moreover, four-fifths of UNHCR's refugee status determination work (in terms of applications received) was concentrated in 10 countries.

Events related to the 'arab spring', in particular in Libya and the Syrian Arab Republic, placed significant pressure on UNHCR's RSD operations in the Middle East and North Africa as well as Turkey. These operations had to respond not only to the protection needs arising from the large-scale influxes of Libyans and Syrians, but also to increased numbers of asylum-seekers and refugees from third countries residing or transiting in Libya and the Syrian Arab Republic, in addition to on-going influxes from other neighbouring countries. On-going conflict in the East and Horn of Africa continued to result in large scale influxes

of Somalis and Ethiopians to Yemen, while insecurity inside the country contributed to increased numbers of asylum-seekers on the territory approaching UNHCR.

The highest number of new asylum claims filed by individuals with UNHCR, or with States, originated from Zimbabwe (52,500), Afghanistan (43,000), Somalia (35,900), Côte

d'Ivoire (33,000), the Democratic Republic of the Congo (31,500), Myanmar (29,800), and Iraq (29,100). [See map 4].

As in previous years, these figures conceal the fact that certain nationalities tend to cluster in a limited number of countries. For instance, 9 out of 10 Zimbabwean asylum claims were lodged in South Africa. Almost half of all Afghan asylum claims were lodged

either in Turkey (7,900) or Germany (5,800). Similarly, half of all Somali asylum requests were submitted in South Africa (10,000), Sweden (4,000), and Uganda (4,000). Even though asylum-seekers from Côte d'Ivoire sought protection in almost 90 countries, 7 out of 10 requested refugee status either in Ghana (18,000 claims) or in Togo (5,200 claims).

DECISIONS

Available data indicate that some 577,100 decisions on individual asylum applications were rendered during 2011. UNHCR staff adjudicated 52,600, or 9 per cent of the total – a slightly lower share than in 2010 (11%). In 10 countries, some 6,500 substantive decisions were taken in joint UNHCR and state procedures. All these figures exclude cases which were closed for administrative reasons⁶³ without a decision on the substance. In 2011, at least 192,500 cases were closed without substantive decisions issued to applicants.

Some 216,500 asylum-seekers were recognized as refugees (172,500) or given a complementary form of protection (44,000) in the course of 2011. This number includes an estimated 21,100⁶⁴ individuals whose initial negative decisions were subsequently overturned at the appeal or review stage. For countries where the percentage of decisions overturned at the appeal stage is particularly high, this may indicate deficiencies in their asylum procedures.

Some 360,700 claims were rejected on substantive grounds. This number includes negative decisions at the first instance, which may be subject to ap-

peal. Asylum-seekers rejected at first and second instances may have been counted twice.

At the global level (UNHCR and state asylum procedures combined), the refugee recognition rate (RRR) was estimated to be 30 per cent of all substantive decisions taken during 2011, while the total recognition rate (TRR) was 38 per cent. These rates are similar to those of 2010 (30 per cent for RRR and 39 per cent for TRR). Global recognition rates remain indicative, as some states have not reported the relevant data. The real proportion of positive decisions is probably slightly higher than these rates, as decisions for those rejected on appeal may have been counted twice. Among the main receiving industrialized countries, where states are responsible for conducting refugee status determination, Switzerland and Finland had the highest TRR at the first instance in 2011 (72% and 67%, respectively). Among the countries listed in Table IV.2, TRRs in 2011 were above 50 per cent. Jordan was the only exception, with a TRR of 39 per cent. Both rates were below those of 2009 (38 per cent for RRR and 47 per cent for TRR).

Among the main countries of origin of asylum-seekers in 2011, the TRR for persons from Eritrea, Myanmar, Somalia and Sudan were highest, at over 80 per cent at the first instance. Recognition rates were also high for asylum-seekers from Côte d'Ivoire (69%), the Democratic Republic of the Congo (61%), Iraq (61%), the Islamic Republic of Iran (60%), China (56%), the Syrian Arab Republic (56%), and Afghanistan (53%). In contrast, the TRR for asylum-seekers from Zimbabwe, the top country of origin of asylum-seekers in 2011 worldwide, was only 5 per cent.

By the end of the year, some 895,000 individuals were awaiting decisions on their asylum claims. This figure includes people at any stage of the asylum procedure; however, the real magnitude of undecided asylum cases is unknown, as many countries do not report this information.

In focus:
Implementing individual refugee status determination procedures in emergency and other special operations

RESPONDING IN EMERGENCIES

UNHCR is regularly called upon to respond to large-scale displacement crises through the implementation of emergency protection operations. In situations of sudden large-scale outflows of refugees across international borders, caused by conflict or other disasters, refugee status determination (RSD) activities have traditionally formed only one part of comprehensive and complex protection and assistance responses. In these contexts, UNHCR and governments have traditionally relied upon group approaches to RSD for populations considered to be in need of international protection.

Recent years have witnessed significant changes in displacement patterns, evidenced by the increasingly mixed composition of migration flows, as well as protection environments, characterized by the increasing prominence of national security concerns in state responses to displacement. While these changes have had an impact on all aspects of the protection and assistance activities undertaken by UNHCR and its partners, they have increasingly required the implementation of individualised ap-

proaches to RSD procedures as part of emergency protection operations, in particular in situations of mass influx.

Events related to the ‘arab spring’, in particular the uprisings in Libya and the syrian arab republic, placed significant pressure on UNHCR’s operations in the middle east and north africa as well as europe. In response to large-scale population outflows from Libya, UNHCR and its partners were required to implement significant emergency protection operations at the Egyptian and Tunisian borders. In the midst of the evacuation of 210,000 migrant workers leaving Libya, UNHCR had to establish significant individual RSD and resettlement operations in the desert for fleeing third-country nationals.

At the Egyptian border, UNHCR registered 1,900 asylum-seekers, in addition to the 5,200 newly registered asylum-seekers in the urban operation in cairo, transforming Egypt into unhr’s fourth largest RSD operation in 2011, in terms of new asylum applications registered. At the Tunisian border, UNHCR registered 2,900 asylum-seekers, in addition to 1,600 newly registered asylum applicants in the urban operation in Tunis. This elevated Tunisia, which had tradition-

ally registered very limited numbers of asylum-seekers, into unhr’s ninth largest RSD operation in 2011. The complexity of the emergency RSD operation in Tunisia as a result of the variety of nationalities and claims registered, presented significant challenges to the development and implementation of individual RSD procedures as well as the overall protection response implemented by unhr and its partners.

The swift implementation and effective management of individual RSD procedures, including the establishment of the physical and technical infrastructure required to process the high volume of asylum applications registered was essential for the implementation of the emergency resettlement operations in Egypt and Tunisia.⁶⁵ In addition to hosting the emergency operations at their borders, both countries provided temporary protection to tens of thousands of Libyans.

FIELD SUPPORT

A particular challenge for UNHCR in this context was the identification and fast deployment of sufficient numbers of qualified RSD and support staff to establish and maintain the required processing capacity in the emergency.

Recognition rates

In the absence of an internationally agreed methodology for calculating recognition rates, UNHCR uses two rates to determine the proportion of refugee claims accepted during the year.

The Refugee Recognition Rate divides the number of asylum-seekers granted Convention refugee

status by the total number of substantive decisions (Convention status, complementary protection, and rejected cases).

The **Total Recognition Rate** divides the number of asylum-seekers granted Convention refugee status and complementary form of protection by the total

number of substantive decisions (Convention status, complementary protection, and rejected cases). Non-substantive decisions are, to the extent possible, excluded from both calculations. For the purpose of global comparability, UNHCR only uses these two recognition rates and does not report rates calculated by national entities. ●



At the height of the emergency, the border operations comprised more than 30 RSD staff as well as several dozen support staff for tasks such as registration, counselling, interpretation, and it.

In 2011, UNHCR was also called upon to implement several special individual RSD operations to ensure the protection of persons of concern in contexts where particular political sensitivities or other considerations presented obstacles to the direct engagement of states in the RSD procedures. The most significant challenges

were posed by the on-going special operation implemented by UNHCR in Iraq to process applications for international protection submitted by some 3,200 residents of the former camp Ashraf which hosted exiled members of the people's mujahedin of the Islamic Republic of Iran. UNHCR has

faced unprecedented challenges in the development and implementation of this special operation, in view of strict security requirements surrounding the operation as well pressures to implement timely solutions for this group. In this operation, too, the identification and fast deployment of sufficient numbers of qualified protection and support staff to establish and maintain the required processing capacity presented a particular challenge.

The requirement to implement an unprecedented number of individual RSD procedures in emergency and other special operations created particular challenges for UNHCR in 2011. Such operations are a feature of the landscape of modern mass displacement and UNHCR is undertaking a series of initiatives to enhance its preparedness and capacity to develop and implement context-specific individual RSD procedures in emergency and other special operations. ■

Demographic Characteristics and Types of Location

DEMOGRAPHIC TRENDS across various categories for persons of concern have experienced dynamic changes that are worthy of analysis. Unfortunately, demographic data has been partially and unevenly available across the countries and various categories of the populations of concern to UNHCR.

The importance of disaggregated demographic data cannot be overemphasized. For instance, demographic data can provide guidance and inferences to determine growth rates of numbers of persons of concern within a specific location over a given period of time. Growth rates in totals of persons of concern can help effective planning in the areas of schools and shelters. The number of shelters and expansion of school facilities in the locations of persons of concerns, for example, are impacted by the growth rate, among other factors. Similarly, health care interventions and self-sufficient projects are normally based on the growth rates of the persons of concern.

Demographic information, particularly on children, is crucial in providing the required levels of protection and assistance. Disaggregated data can potentially provide a basis for identifying unaccompanied minors and vulnerable persons with specific

needs in order to better provide appropriate interventions.

This chapter analyzes demographic trends for various categories of persons of concern. An analysis of demographic trends is not complete without including data on the sex, age and location of the persons of concern. Therefore, the chapter first provides an overview of the current availability of demographic data. Second, it reviews detailed demographic characteristics with respect to disaggregated data by sex and age groups. Third, it analyzes data based on the various types of locations, in order to identify gaps in the delivery of protection, assistance and monitoring in UNHCR operations. Finally, the pattern of demographic change of refugee children over time is analyzed.

Disaggregated data on persons of concern are mostly available in areas where UNHCR has an operational role. As a result, sex and age breakdowns of the various population of concern are not available in some countries that supply such demographic data. In particular, it is lacking in several industrialized countries where information on persons of concern is mainly collected by governments. Similarly, demographic information on the types of locations where UNHCR beneficiaries reside is unevenly available. The lack of re-

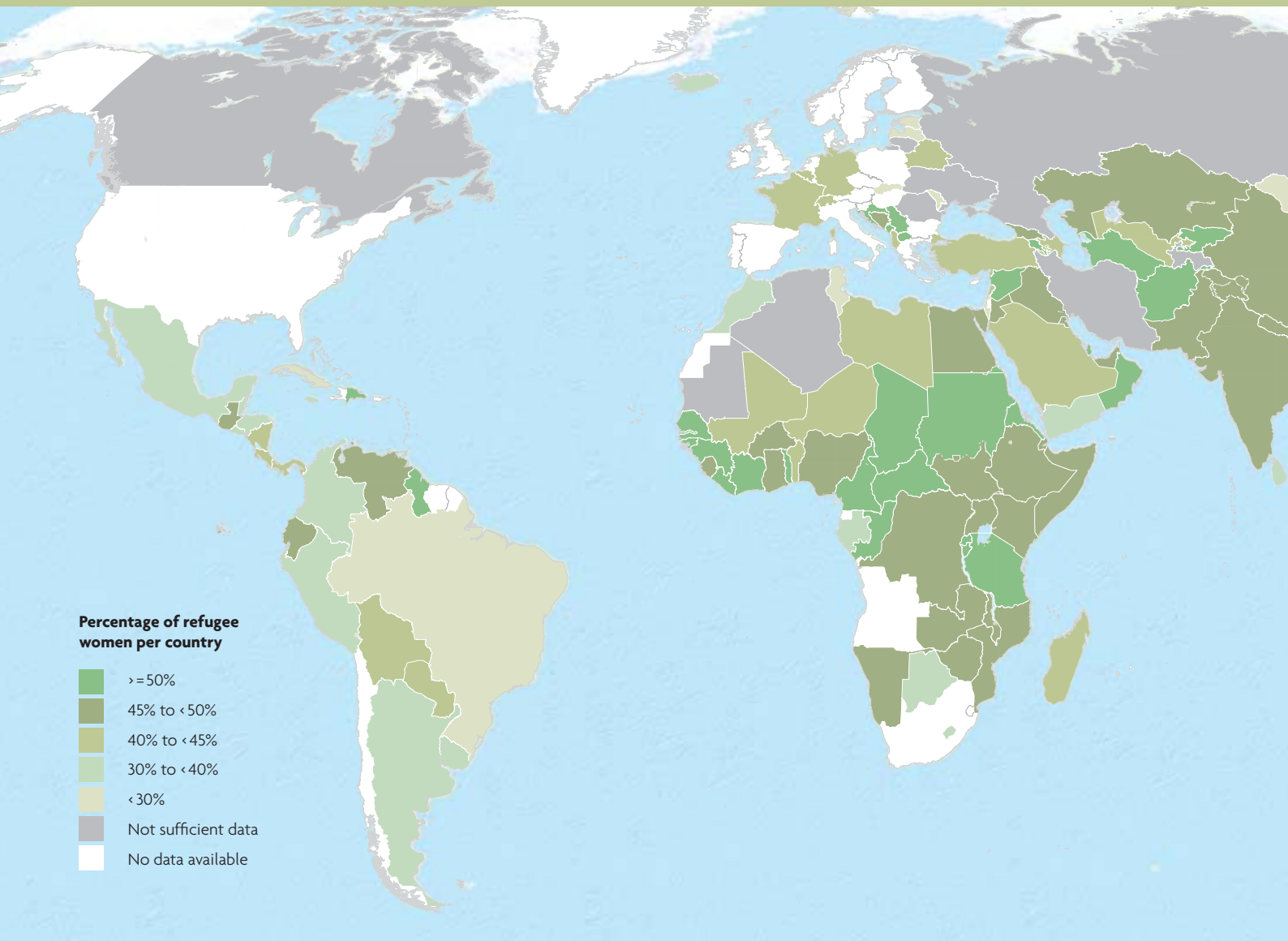
quired data makes an effective and meaningful analysis more difficult.

UNHCR continues to encourage governments to improve their data collection with a focus on providing disaggregated data. It is important to note that over the past two years there has been significant progress in this regard. For instance, 155 countries provided disaggregated data in 2011 as compared to 140 in 2010. It is hoped that this will continue and cover all the categories of persons where disaggregated demographic data are partial and uneven.

SEX AND AGE

The total population of concern to UNHCR recorded at the end of 2011 was 35.4 million. Demographic data broken down by sex was made available for 24.4 million persons in 155 countries or territories. The availability of data on sex and age varied across the various types of population categories. It was high for refugees, IDPs, returned refugees, and others of concern, but low for asylum-seekers, IDP returnees, and stateless persons.

Significant regional variation in the availability of demographic data was also noted. With the exception of southern Africa and the central Africa and Great Lakes regions, information on the sex breakdown was available for more than 50 per cent of all persons of



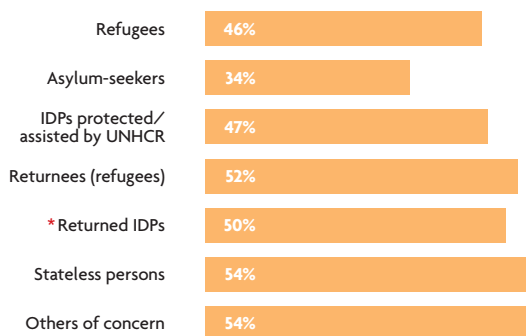
concern. Southern africa recorded the lowest percentage (20%) in terms of availability of demographic data by sex. In the western africa region, de-

mographic data broken down by sex was available for all persons of concern (100%). Similarly, data availability was high in the americas and the east

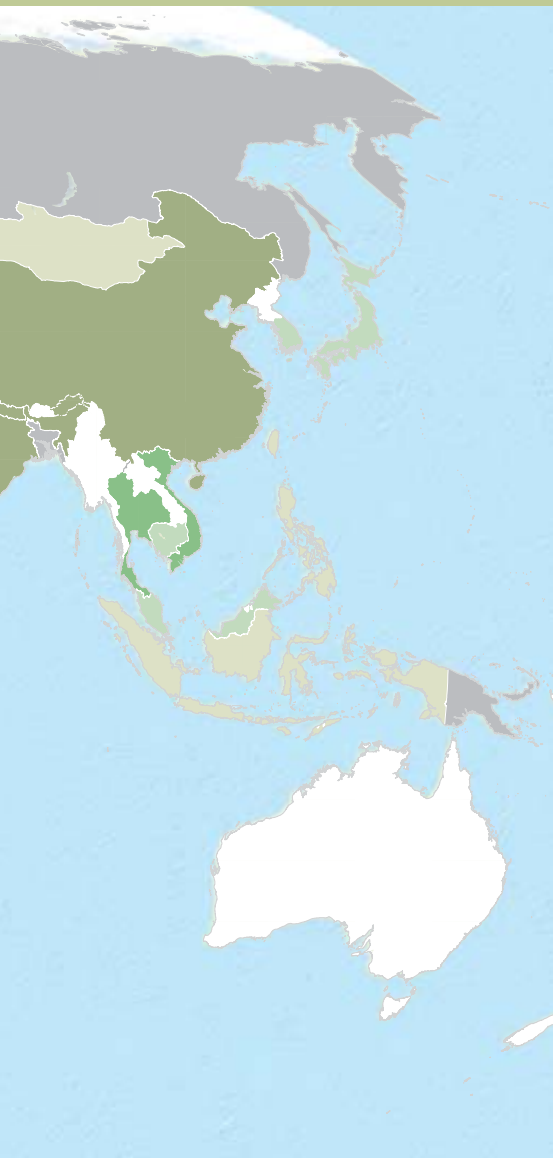
and horn of africa with 90 and 83 per cent, respectively, while the middle east and north africa and asia and pacific regions showed 73 and 65 per cent coverage respectively. By the end of 2011, availability of demographic data in europe broken down by sex for all persons of concern stood at 53 per cent.

According to available data (covering 24.4 million people), on average, women and girls constituted 49 per cent of persons of concern to UNHCR. They accounted for 48 per cent of refugees, and half of all IDPs and returnees (former refugees) at the end of 2011. In general, there were no significant differences between males and females within each age cohort of the refugee population. The average percentage of females in all age cohorts of the refugee population remains unchanged at 49 per cent compared to 2010.

Information on age breakdown was available for 15.8 million (45%) of the 35.4 million persons of concern to UNHCR. The data coverage was relatively high for refugees (67%) and others of concern (81%). Children below the age of 18 years represented 47 per cent, including 13 per cent below the age of five. Forty-eight per cent were between 18 and 59 years old and 5 per cent were 60 years and above.

The percentage of children recorded at the end of 2011 varied among the various population categories. For instance, 46 per cent of refugees and 34 per cent of asylum-seekers were children below 18 years of age. There has been a marginal increase in the percentage of refu-

gee children from 44 per cent in 2010 to 46 per cent in 2011. Similarly, the percentage of asylum-seeking children has increased modestly from 31 per cent in 2010 to 34 per cent in 2011. Overall, the available data indicated that roughly half of all persons of concern to UNHCR (49%) were girls below the age of 18. Figure V.1 depicts the percentage of children by population category.

The availability of information by age breakdown was particularly limited with respect to developed countries in Europe, North America and Oceania. The figures are therefore not fully representative of the entire population under UNHCR's responsibility.

Types of location

UNHCR provides statistical breakdowns on the various types of locations for its persons of concern. This type of information is mostly available for refugees, asylum-seekers and IDPs. Stateless persons are the least represented category for which data is available in view of the difficulty of identifying this population. In 2011, unhr offices reported the following types of locations: camps, collective centres, individual accommodation (private), settlements, or undefined (the denomination used if the type was unclear). Offices reported on the type of location for 900 individual locations covering some 13 million persons of concern.⁶⁶ The available evidence shows that refugee camps and settlements

are mostly located in rural areas while refugees residing in individual accommodation are found mainly in urban areas. Sub-saharan africa is host to the overwhelming majority of refugees residing in camps. IDPs (including returned IDPs), however, most often reside in rural areas.

Of the 10.4 million refugees recorded at the end of 2011, the type of accommodation was known for 7.7 million, representing 74 per cent. This implies that the type of accommodation is unknown for approximately one-quarter of the world's refugees. Where data is available, evidence shows that 56 per cent of refugees are residing in individual accommodations and 34 per cent in camps.

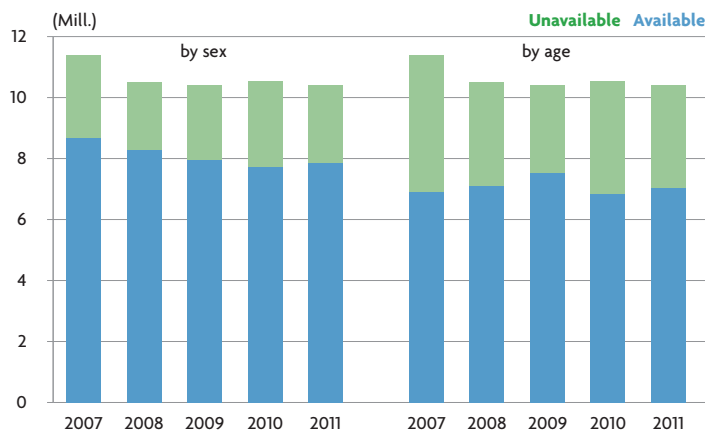
Only small percentages are known to reside in collective centres (4%) or settlements (6%).

In terms of gender distribution across the types of accommodation, there is no significant difference between refugee men and women. Similarly, refugee children are fairly equally distributed among the different types of accommodations. The percentage of children in camps and in settlements is both 56 per cent, slightly higher than that of children in centres and individual accommodation (see table V.1).

In focus: demographic trends of refugee children

As outlined above, the availability of demographic data on refugees is limited and does not permit an analysis of demographic trends at the global level. Moreover, the data tends to be positively skewed towards developing countries, for two reasons. First, roughly 80 per cent of the global refugee population resides in the developing world. Second, most of the demographic information available to UNHCR is limited to developing countries. Therefore, the analysis of demographic trends discussed in this section does not fully represent the global number of refugee children. Full coverage of sex-aggregated data is short by an average of 24 per cent in the last five years, while the corresponding value for age-disaggregated data is 33 per cent. Figure V.2 illustrates the availability of refugee data disaggregated by sex and age. The total number of refugee children for whom demographic data exist has fluctuated between 3.0 and 3.2 million per year during the period under consideration.

In absolute terms, both the female and male populations of refugee children have experienced fluctuations in their numbers between 2007 and 2011. In relative terms, however, their number has remained fairly stable (see Figure V.3). The available data indicate

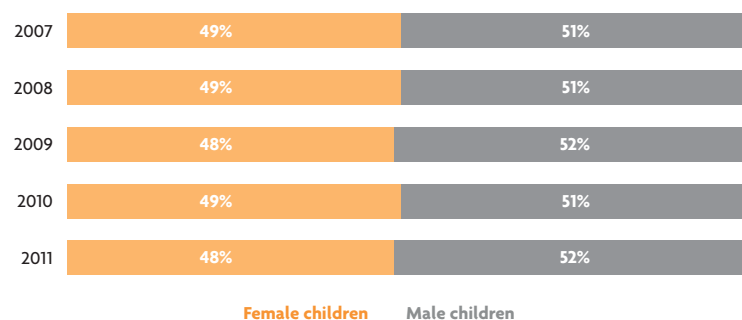
that the percentage of male refugee children has consistently surpassed that of female refugee children. While the former stood at an annual average of 51-52 per cent, the latter remained at an average of 48-49 per cent. The corresponding values for the total male and female refugee population show a slightly wider gap. The percentage of refugee women ranged between 47 and 48 per cent while that for refugee men between 52 and 53 per cent.

The distribution of refugee children by age cohorts reveals an interesting development over the past five years. Between 2007 and 2009, the percentage of refugee children below the age of five steadily dropped (see Figure V.4). One possible reason for this trend could be the relatively

high number of refugee children who returned voluntarily to their countries of origin during the period under consideration. In the past two years, however, their percentage has increased significantly which can be explained partly by the high number of new arrivals of refugee infants and children in West, East and the Horn

of Africa. Similarly, the total number of school-age male children has remained slightly higher than that of female children.

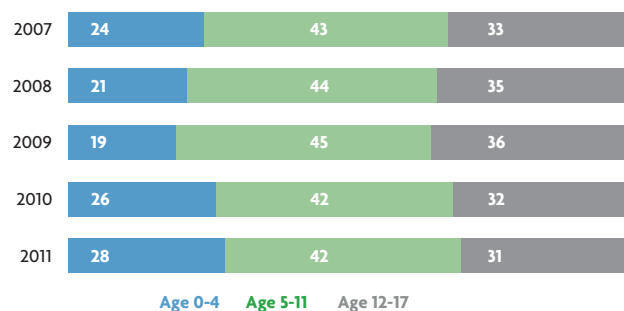
The demographic changes of refugee children living in both camps and urban areas during the period 2007-2011 demonstrate a shift in refugee population trends. The limited information on both location and demographics indicates that the number of refugee children living in urban areas consistently surpassed those living in camps between 2007 and 2010. However, in 2011 this trend was reversed with the total number of refugee children residing in camps being slightly higher. This can also be explained by the high number of new refugee arrivals in West, East and the Horn of Africa, most of who were accommodated in camps.

The number of male refugee children living in camps was consistently

higher than that of female refugee children between 2007 and 2011. The same trend has been observed in urban areas. The number of refugee children below the age of five living in camps has remained consistently higher than of those living in urban areas. Between 2007 and 2010, the number of refugee girls (5-17 years

old) living in urban areas was significantly higher than the number for those living in camps. This trend was reversed in 2011 with a higher number of refugee girls being reported as residing in camps rather than in urban areas. ■

6 Information Management in UNHCR: From Data to Protection

WHILE UNHCR HAS collected and managed information for years, the methods and tools used have changed over time. Technological advancements have changed the way the organization collects and communicates information. As a consequence, UNHCR's approach to data collection, processing, analysis and dissemination has changed as well.

Recent effort to improve data management is the objective of the High Commissioner's Information and Data Management Strategy 2012-2014. The strategy builds upon the organization's existing strengths and systems – such as population data management, geographical information analysis, the Gender Based Violence Information Management System (GBVIMS),⁶⁸ standards and indicators reporting, registration software *pro-Gres*, and the web-based Health Infor-

mation System (HIS)⁶⁹ – and promotes areas new to UNHCR. The strategy is designed to support field operations in fully assuming the organization's responsibilities for leading and coordinating information management (IM) in various contexts and continues to strengthen IM as a core responsibility of the organization. Through the Strategy, UNHCR aims to become a responsive and predictable provider of information products to those providing protection and assistance to persons of concern.

This chapter provides an overview of the principal objectives of UNHCR's Information and Data Management Strategy and its potential use to inform and support protection and assistance activities in the field. The case studies Ethiopia and Côte d'Ivoire illustrate the importance and impact of Information Management in support of evidence-based decision-making in an emergency context.

BACKGROUND

To meet the High Commissioner's aspirations for IM, the strategy contains seven priority objectives.

Another important factor that characterizes UNHCR's IM approach and strategy is that it brings together internal and external information sources and systems in a logical,

manageable and coherent way. Linkages and support to needs assessment and monitoring work by the Inter-Agency Standing Committee (IASC), cluster-specific systems in

The seven priority objectives for IM

1. UNHCR's mandated leadership role in refugee situations is reinforced by predictable IM activities which are designed to serve all partners.
2. UNHCR delivers on its IM responsibilities in global and field clusters as they are defined by a lead cluster role and expected by the humanitarian community.
3. UNHCR systematically deploys skilled and respected IM personnel and resources to its field operations, starting in refugee emergencies through to solutions.
4. UNHCR's humanitarian population data management skills are maintained and strengthened.
5. UNHCR develops and disseminates credible protection monitoring systems, providing quality and actionable information.
6. UNHCR's needs assessment practices are institutionalized and further professionalized with particular regard to advice on assessment methods, and on participation in and coordination of joint and harmonized needs assessments.
7. UNHCR's IM activities are based on established standards and procedures for operational data collection, management and distribution. ●

the Protection, Emergency Shelter and Camp Coordination and Camp Management (CCCM) clusters, and other important and well-functioning tools designed and utilized by specific field operations are included in the approach.

Historically, organizations have coveted information in the belief that this strategy empowered them over others. In today's inter-agency world, however, one way organisations demonstrate their leadership is by serving

as an information source for others. Advantages arising from comprehensive IM activities are clear and UNHCR is working to systematically include IM in its work with partners. Moreover, strong IM allows for better use of the substantial amount of quality data and information generated and improves efficiencies in handling data which cuts costs and turn-around times for products. By continuing to strengthen IM in UNHCR, direct benefits will not only be experienced

by the organization and its partners, but most importantly by refugees and other populations of concern.

The following sections briefly describe the information management activities and challenges faced by UNHCR and partners during the recent emergencies in Ethiopia and Côte d'Ivoire. It concludes with lessons learned from these situations as well other emergencies and provides an insight into the future of UNHCR's Information Management strategy.

The Role of Information Management in Supporting the Public Health Response in Ethiopia

BACKGROUND

In 2011, Somalia was at the heart of one of the worst humanitarian crises in the world. Twenty years of conflict and waves of drought uprooted a quarter of the country's estimated 7.5 million people. In the beginning of September 2011, famine⁷¹ was declared in six regions of Somalia, and programmes in Kenya and Ethiopia were initially over-

whelmed. In response to the massive influx of refugees, where both malnutrition and mortality were rampant, UNHCR and partners scaled up operations to provide sufficient food, health care and treatment to the malnourished. A widespread measles outbreak occurred in both Ethiopia and Kenya which increased mortality amongst new arrivals. In view of the prevailing humanitarian crisis, UNHCR deployed innovative Information Management tools alongside traditional field-based epidemiological methods to guide decision-making and inform effective and timely interventions, including the measurement of mortality and malnutrition, outbreak monitoring and health response coordination.

MORTALITY

Mortality is one of the most important indicators for measuring the severity of a refugee crisis and is used to determine the threshold above which an emergency should be declared. However, the accurate measurement of mortality in an emergency can be extremely challenging. While recording deaths in health centres is the easiest

method for measuring mortality, community-based deaths are generally excluded from these figures.

A solution is to establish community-based reporting systems, strengthen community networks and employ trained community-health workers to systematically report any deaths that occur in households that fall under their responsibility. However, establishing such mechanisms is a difficult and time consuming task, requiring training and careful management of community health workers. This was considered impossible during the initial stages of the Dollo Ado emergency in Ethiopia due to the lack of trained health staff. Therefore, alternative methods for measuring mortality were required, and a traditional epidemiological technique of estimating crude and under five mortality levels using weekly grave counts was implemented in two newly established camps (see photo on page 55). Although grave counts are a relatively basic method of estimating crude mortality rates and have a number of limitations, they were deemed to be the most reliable method for assessing the crisis at the beginning.

What is Information/Data Management in UNHCR?

Information/Data Management is the capture, handling, storage, analysis and dissemination of data pertaining specifically to operations and the populations of concern, including demographic and statistical information.

It involves information on needs and conditions, geo-referenced information, and information related to protection and sector-specific concerns related to needs, delivery and impact in health, nutrition, water/sanitation, core relief items, shelter and education⁷⁰.

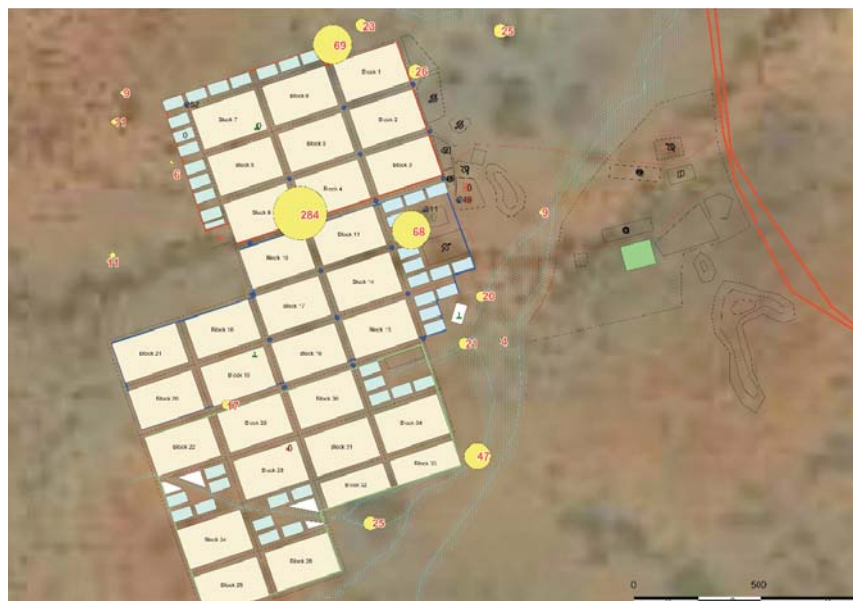

THIS METHOD was not implemented without challenges, however. In order to support the accuracy of data collected, traditional grave counting was combined with GPS⁷² technology to map the coordinates of each graveyard. By plotting all of the gravesites on a map, it was possible to ensure that investigators could return to the same sites each week to update grave counts (see *Figure VI.1*). Although data was collected using simple paper-based reporting forms, the final indicators were entered into the web-based Health Information System. Results were automatically published in Camp Factsheets and shared with partners.

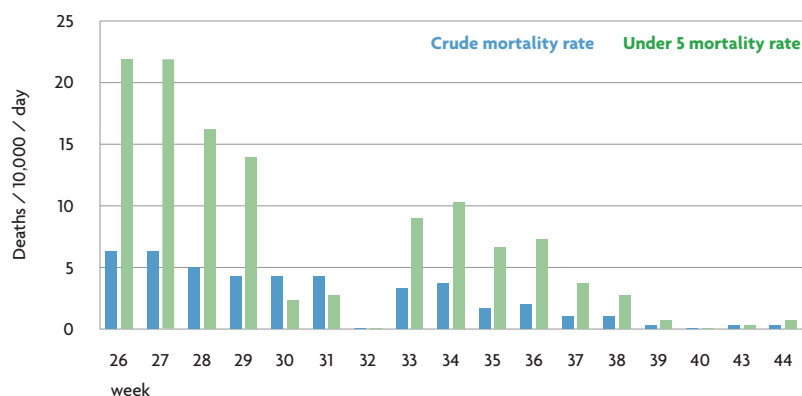

At the start of the emergency, crude mortality rates as high as 5 deaths per 10,000 per day were recorded.⁷³ Through consistent, reliable

data collection and effective Information Management it was possible to monitor this trend over the duration of the emergency. Within two to

three months, mortality rates were reduced to below emergency thresholds due to targeted interventions (see Figure VI.2).

MALNUTRITION

Alongside mortality, acute malnutrition rates are an important indicator used to measure the severity of a refugee crisis. Acute malnutrition levels of 33 per cent were registered in the Ethiopian refugee camps of Melkadida and Bokolmayo in March and April 2011. In Somalia, populations fled as the food security situation was in rapid decline, exacerbated by increased violence and conflict within the country.

UNHCR and its partners used traditional methods to rapidly screen

children under five years of age upon arrival, and periodically within camps, to measure the malnutrition status. This information allowed decision-makers to monitor the trends in malnutrition status over time, and also permitted individual children who were detected as being malnourished to be referred for appropriate care and treatment.

At a population level, UNHCR and its partners used community health workers to support a mass nutritional screening of all children under five. This screening coincided with mass measles and polio vaccinations to ensure widespread coverage. After electronically collecting the screening data, the final rates were entered into a web-application so the results could be compared with other routine nutrition indicators collected from selective feeding programmes. Integrating data from different sources permitted decision-makers to assess whether high malnutrition was reflected in health centre admission rates, in order to adapt the programmes accordingly. This use of Information Management was the first time UNHCR was able to provide a rapid, comprehensive view of the public health and nutrition needs of a population during an emergency and to monitor the strength of the response.

MONITORING DISEASE OUTBREAKS

In August 2011, a large measles outbreak was declared in Kobe refugee camp, Ethiopia and soon spread to other camps in the Dollo Ado area. During an active outbreak such as the one witnessed in Ethiopia, it is essential that information on the number of cases and deaths is captured in a timely manner on a daily basis. The data must also be rapidly shared with all partners in order to enable careful outbreak monitoring, and for targeted interventions. Innovative approaches to Information Management in public health were used in the collection and management of disease outbreak data.

This information needed to be rapidly consolidated and disseminated to partners involved in the response,

including a number of health agencies and other sectors such as health, nutrition, water/sanitation, education and camp management. To support this, UNHCR adapted its online Health Information System (webHIS) to permit daily outbreak data entry in each camp. Once entered, a consolidated report could be printed and shared with all partners to facilitate coordination and prompt action.

COORDINATING THE RESPONSE

During the Dollo Ado emergency, online data entry was combined with data visualization and publication of informational products to support the public health response. The webHIS application was deployed as a system

that could be accessed by UNHCR and partners at field, regional and headquarters level, to access the most current emergency-related statistics.

The publication of regular Emergency Camp Profiles in Dollo Ado⁷⁴ was an important coordination tool. These camp profiles summarized key indicators across the sectors of public health, nutrition, HIV/AIDS, and water/sanitation, and could be rapidly generated, printed, and shared for coordination meetings. A review system was established within the webHIS to ensure data quality prior to publication on the UNHCR Operational Data Portal⁷⁵ for dissemination to other sectors and the expanded humanitarian community.

The role of information management in supporting the public health response to the refugee emergency in Ethiopia is a good example of how information management can be used to strengthen UNHCR's capacity to provide a timely, agile and flexible response to lead and coordinate international action for the protection of populations of concern.

B. The Role of Information Management in Supporting the Emergency Response in Côte d'Ivoire

BACKGROUND

Since 2002, conflict within Côte d'Ivoire has driven internal displacements. Starting late 2010, a new wave of displacement resulted from the political standoff following elections. An estimated one million people were driven from their homes, and forced to seek security and safety elsewhere in the country.

Over the years, the United Nations and its partners have undertaken data collection activities to understand the scale and effects of displacement. Studies estimating the total number and location of displaced populations were conducted by a number of agencies, including UNHCR, the Danish Refugee

Council, and Tufts University.⁷⁶

Four months of post-election disruption, an estimated 200,000 people remained displaced in western Côte d'Ivoire. While the security situation in Abidjan and surrounding areas stabilized, at the western border with Liberia tension and security incidents continued. Historical land issues between communities were exacerbated by the presence of armed forces supporting the two presidents and resulting violence.

The situation was characterized as follows: despite perceived insecurity and lack of basic conditions, thousands of IDPs returned to their

villages and were in desperate need of protection and assistance. A substantial number of IDPs and returned refugees sought integration or settlement elsewhere in the country, particularly in Abidjan. The start of the annual agricultural season triggered spontaneous returns as many farmers went back to prepare fields. The potential for further inter-communal violence kept some specific groups from returning to their home. The vast majority of IDPs were hosted with individual families, with only a small proportion seeking shelter in camps and collective centres.

INFORMATION MANAGEMENT – ACTIVITIES AND CHALLENGES

The role of information management in supporting the emergency response in Côte d'Ivoire was crucial given the complex nature of the situation and the rapidly changing population displacement patterns. The IM activities largely revolved around obtaining accurate population figures, establishing a proper geographic referential data system, harmonization of data collection processes, and ensuring the dissemination of data.

As leader of the Protection and Shelter Clusters, UNHCR needed to provide information on violations against people and/or their property at a given location. Collecting protection data proved challenging due to its sensitive nature and the insecurity in many field locations.

In order to produce sound geographic analysis, communes, towns and locality levels had to be distinguished. In Côte d'Ivoire, initial population reports were misinterpreted

due to incorrect figure aggregation and confusion between administrative levels when locations could not be accurately identified on a map. To help solve this problem, UNHCR established a proper geographic referential system. In the absence of data on official boundaries, a set of files were created and shared in the Common Operational Dataset (COD) platform from the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA). UNHCR also mapped the location of Liberian refugees in Côte d'Ivoire as well as the location of origin of Ivorian refugees residing in Liberia.

Another challenge faced by UNHCR and partners in Côte d'Ivoire was obtaining accurate population figures. UNHCR and the World Food Programme (WFP) figures only reflected those that had approached UNHCR or one of its partners. As the populations approaching these two

organizations were rarely the same, the figures of the two agencies were rarely identical. Furthermore, WFP had household-level registration information while UNHCR relied on a network of field monitors to capture population estimates through local communities and/or implementing partners. As a result, data discrepancies were observed in 17 locations.

A common method for capturing population data was required. UNHCR hosted a working group with operational partners to resolve the discrepancies in figures and to consolidate statistics from all sources (UNHCR, WFP, FAO, and UNFPA) into one overall figure. UNHCR also encouraged inter-agency collaboration on data collection and reporting process issues, including the need to share forms, tools, standard operating procedures and training. This reinforced collaboration with other agencies and non-governmental organiza-

tions on improved information sharing between managers and monitors.

Collaborative training ensured harmonized reporting formats for use with IDPs in the southeast of the country, including harmonized counting forms and evaluations of people with specific needs and protection issues in Abidjan. Local information management staff were identified and trained to ensure a proper handover to the emergency support team. Efforts resulted in a sustainable revision of population figures and characteristics with a commonly agreed upon format at the country level.

DATA DISSEMINATION

The dissemination of humanitarian information has traditionally been organized around the production and exchange of static documents, efficient for the publication of situation reports, sectoral assessments or specific analysis but limiting the exchange and dissemination of data. Successful data dissemination requires accessible and visually meaningful formats that allow partners to do planning based on authoritative figures. Storing data and relevant documents in a centralized location in Côte d'Ivoire proved important to the information coordination between clusters and sectors.

In emergency refugee operations, UNHCR tends to use its Operational Data Portal⁷⁷ to share information with its partners and other stakeholders. In Côte d'Ivoire, however, UNHCR formed an Information Management working group in collaboration with OCHA to configure and present the One-Response platform⁷⁸ for disseminating and organizing reports and publishing key documents on ReliefWeb⁷⁹.

A refugee from Côte d'Ivoire is being registered by UNHCR at the Bahn refugee camp in Liberia. Liberia received an estimated 200,000 Ivorian refugees in the course of 2011.

Conclusion

In order to uphold its mandate to protect and assist refugees and other persons of concern, UNHCR has collected and maintained relevant information for decades. As the needs for data have evolved, so too have the tools for its collection and the communication channels through which the information is disseminated. In response to these changes, UNHCR has prioritized information management activities outlined in its Information and Data Management Strategy 2012–2014. Lessons learned through recent humanitarian emergencies and refugee situations have enabled the organization to create innovative solutions to identified information management gaps and challenges. Enhancing organizational and operational information management capacity allows for increased information sharing among partners and ultimately improves services for refugees and other populations of concern.

Though information is understood to be vital in mobilizing resources and achieving protection results, information overload can overwhelm operational managers and contribute to poor communication. UNHCR's IM approach focuses on generating better quality information in a predictable way.

The importance of good Information Management was clearly evident in 2011 during the emergencies in North, West and the Horn of Africa. Thanks to the IM capacity in these operations, UNHCR proved its ability to provide partners with quality data; collecting it from a wide range of providers (including governmental sources, implementing and operational partners, and donors), validating and updating it through a process of consultative verification, and disseminating it in a user-friendly, predictable, participative and immediate manner.

The success of these efforts is based on several key factors: speed (timeliness), expertise, standard approaches

and tools, and a receptive management environment. The UNHCR Information and Data Management Strategy is being implemented with the aim to standardize these experiences across the organization as a whole, including the creation of IM Officer positions in the field.

The products generated by IM experts is information which can be readily shared and utilized by partners in the field. These products, such as camp profiles, maps, statistical information, "who does what where" (3Ws) information, also help facilitate understanding of complex operational realities and serve as tools for public information and resource mobilization. Support from IM experts was also crucial to ensuring platforms for sharing relevant inter-agency information, coordinating inter-sectoral IM activities and facilitating inter-agency agreement on the interpretation of statistical data.

These activities enhanced UNHCR's emergency response capacity as they not only facilitated and improved coordination among several actors, they also allowed the organization to make evidence-based decisions, avoid duplication, ensure better targeting, and make effective use of partners' resources by identifying gaps. UNHCR was then able to dedicate its own resources to priority or under-funded areas. Moreover, this IM approach contributed to resource mobilization, as donors found it easy to understand the complexity of needs in the many locations.

Strengthened IM is required across all UNHCR operations, including more stable and protracted operations, to promote improved needs analysis and appropriate responses with partners. Even in offices where UNHCR has a less direct operational role, IM is important in ensuring decision-makers have access to the data they require in order to advocate for appropriate funding and support for populations of concern. ■
